ORCHID RAISERS SING PRAME.

Rare Specimen Sought for Years is Found in Tibet.

Great excitement has been caused among orchid collectors by the information that a rare specimen whose habitat for nearly fifty years has been sought in vain has been rediscovered. There came to London in 1857, from India, a miscellaneous stock of orchids. They were duly sold at auction, and some of them were bought by a Mr. Fairlie of Liverpool. In his possession they bloomed, and one of them was recognized as a variety previously unknown and of singular beauty. It was named after its owner—Cypripedium Fairleanum. The Indian collection contained several other



Cypripedium Fairleanum, whose native haunt on the Tibet border has been rediscovered, after being lost fifty years. specimens of the same plant and keen was the competition that ensued for their possession. But most of the purchasers simply wasted their money, the plants did not flourish. The original stock dwindled and died. For many years there has been only one specimen in existence among orchid collectors, and a diminutive one at that. But its possession has been sufficient to confer additional distinction on its distinguished owner, Sir Trevor Lawrence, president of the Royal Horticultural Society. The aim of every orchid enthusiast is to get hold of an orchid that nobody else has. Sir Trevor has several times been offered big sums for his puny Fairleanum, but nothing could induce him to part with it.

Shot Fox with Golf Ball. Foxes have been trapped, shot and poisoned from pioneer days, but it has remained for Mortimer Fagan of Troy, N. Y., to kill one with a golf ball, and Mr. Fagan is extremely proud of the exploit. Early in the week Mr. Fagan went out on the links to practice and had made the third tee when a strong head wind came up and he was forced to drive with all his strength to send the gutta percha ball any distance. Just beyond the tee was a natural hazard consisting of a stone pile and a brook, and to clear the latter he struck with all his might. The ball went a bit low, struck the stone pile, caromed and, bounding over the water, struck in the bushes close to the bank. The instant the ball landed Mr. Fagan heard a world, peculiar cry, and ran forward. The next instant he came upon a red fox writhing at the edge of the brook. The hard ball had caught him between the eyes as he was drinking and he died before the man reached him.

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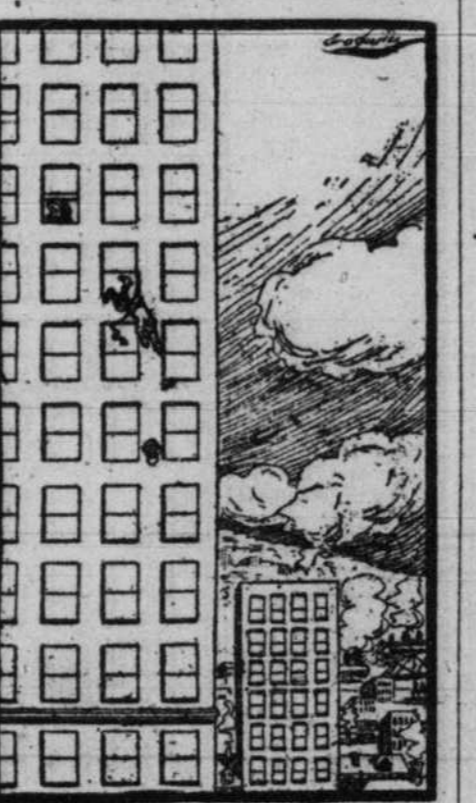
CATS CONSULT THE CALENDAR.

HUNG 200 FEET FROM EARTH, Moments of Agonized Suspense for Pittsburg Window Cleaner. Hiram Johnson, a colored window cleaner at the Frick building, hung suspended by a single strap 200 feet above the street for half an hour recently, says a Pittsburg dispatch. The men in the office rescued him from his perilous position.

Curious Epitaphs. Close to the principal entrance to old Kirk Braddan (Eng.) churchyard is a stone which probably not one in a thousand of the thousands of visitors who assemble there Sunday by Sunday ever notice. It has engraved upon it the following curious inscription: "Here unlyerlyeth the body of the Rev. Mr. Patrick Thompson, minister of God's Word forty years, at present vicar of Kirk Braddan, aged sixty-seven, Anno 1678, deceased A. 1689." The reverend gentleman had his tombstone erected eleven years before he died. The incident, however, is not so uncommon as would at first appear. There is erected a stone in Onehan (I. O. M.) churchyard today, sacred to the memory of a man who is still alive.

Broke Chain Drawing Him to Death. By a desperate burst of strength, which was as that of three or four men, seventeen-year-old Francis Riley of Sugar Notch, Pa., managed to save his life. He was caught in the shaker chain at the Hadleigh colliery while cleaning the machinery and drawn toward a big cog wheel. Fellow workers tried in vain to pull him loose or to bar off the chain in the few brief seconds. Just as Riley was about to be ground to death on the cog wheel he braced himself, seized the big chain with both hands and tore at it with superhuman strength. A link snapped, the chain broke and he was freed.
