IT IS A PRIDE.

The New Home of the Railroad Boys is a Beauty and an Ornament to Las Vegas.

The new passenger station was opened to the public this week and should be a matter of pride to every resident of Las Vegas. The San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake railway have more than fulfilled their promise to the people of Las Vegas in so far as the passenger station is concerned, and this may be taken as indicative of the future policy of the officials of that railroad towards Las Vegas and her development, and the faith they have in her future greatness.

The new station is a beautiful and ornate building in the mission style of architecture, about 150 by 30 feet and two stories high. It is constructed of the best material throughout and practically fireproof. The roof is tiled—the lighting, heating, plumbing, etc., are all of the most modern and sanitary description. There will be a broad, beautiful approach to the station from the head of Fremont street with ample room for vehicles of all descriptions.

The ground floor consists of waiting room, fifty by thirty feet, with two toilets and wash rooms connecting, and opens both on the tracks and towards the plaza. The ticket office and agent's private room are to the north of the waiting room and in the center of the building. The hallway enters from the platform or track side of the station and beyond this comes the baggage room and Pacific Express company office, which room is about twenty-five by twenty feet. From the hallway doors open both into the ticket office and baggage room.

There are four rooms up stairs, all large, airy and well lighted. The entire upper portion of the building will be devoted to telegraphic purposes—train dispatcher's office, Western Union, etc. The ticket office is perfect in its arrangements, handsomely and conveniently furnished, and is presided over by Mr. O. L. Dorman, than whom a better selection could not have been made. By his unflinching courtesy, his prompt and responsive business manner, he has made many friends in Las Vegas.

The entire building is finished in the mission style, with oiled hardwood floors and brass trimmings. Its cost was about forty thousand dollars, and is practically an improved reproduction of the Salt Lake station at Riverside, which has been so praised by the press throughout the country.
