Dear Sir: Referring to "that report," as published in your issue of December 21st, wherein you mention my refusal to act as a member of the grand jury in examining the report of the expert accountant employed by the board of county commissioners, I beg leave to say: My reason for refusing to act in the matter is this: I was not authorized by the grand jury as a body to make an examination of the aforesaid report, and believe that in so doing without authority from them I would be exceeding my privileges as a member of that honorable body, and would be accepting a responsibility I had no right to assume. When the grand jury reconvenes, I will be pleased to serve the people of Lincoln County as an expert accountant or in any other capacity the grand jury may consider me qualified for.
