Reclaiming the Sahara Desert. In the territory to the south of Algeria a government irrigation survey has been at work making a series of deep test borings, some of which are as deep as 2,000 feet. 
That, or Leaving House, Is Alternative of Lovers.


"I've had enough of that place. Yer see. I'd rather be a king among hogs than a hog among kings."


