# COLONEL BEGGED FOR MERCY WATERWORKS OF ATHENS.

Means of Supply of the Ancient Acropolis Have Lately Been Unfearthed.

Grecian water works as well as Grecian poetry have survived to serve the present age. Prof. Dorpfield, while pursuing archaeological researches in Athens, with the purpose of unearthing the fountain of Pisis tratus, discovered a number of small water galleries in the vicinity of the acropolis. More especially beneath the road leading from the market place in Athens, and serving as the route for the processions of the Panathenea, he recognized a series of conduits composed of a pair of pipes of pottery placed one over the other. From the same point, the azora, other similar pipes of a square section, covered with slabs of baked earth, radiated in the direction of the smaller streets.

The antiquity of this system of canalization is beyond doubt, insomuch as the character of the works in connection with it is as old as the Roman and Byzantine epochs. Much knowledge also was obtained respecting the supply of water to the inhabitants of the capital from the many experimental cuttings and trenches.

The aqueduct of Pisistratus, surnamed the Tyrant, was found to pass the Theater of Bacchus and then terminate in a basin where nine conduits discharged their contents, contiguous to the fountain of Kallirrhoe, situsted at the Puyz. This fountain included a couple of pools, one above ground, wherefrom water could be drawn directly, and a second below. acting as a reservoir, and also as an overflow, allowing its surplus water to pass through a pipe into the city for the use of the public. In the aqueduct of Pisistratus the water was transported in round pipes of pottery, with joints carefully fitted. If this acqueduct should fail to be of further service, that of Hadrian serves at the present time for a supply to the Athenian inhabitants.



The simplest way, apparentl , of discovering which is our weaker side is to observe which side we lie upon by preference when in bed, as it is certain that we will instinctively adopt the attitude which is most agreeable, or, rather, which causes the least inconvenience; in other worls, we will lie upon the side the muscles of which, being more vigorous, are less sensible to the pressure upon them of the weight of the body.

Statistics and observation go to prove that in about three cases out of four it is the left side which is the weaker, thus giving reason to the popular dictum. Curiously enough however, pneumonia, it has been no ticed, unlike most diseases, usually attacks at first the right-that is to say, the stronger side of the body.

# **RAFTING ON THE WISCONSIN**

Skill Required in Construction of River Floats to Run Bars and Rapids.

At the mills they made up the big rafts according to a certain system. A crib was made of boards, say, 16 feet long, and was built in layers, cobhouse fashion, until it was perhaps a couple of feet deep, all fastened by long hardwood pegs. Seven of these crib: made a "piece;" and three pieces, side by side, lashed together by lines fastened to the boats, made what was called a "Wisconsin river raft." That was about as large as a raft could be and run safely the various dams and bars and rapids, says Outing. After they got to the mouth of the Wisconsin the men would shift these pieces and bunch up a number of Wisconsin river rafts into one vast, slow-moving snake of sawn timbers, a thing of terror tc all the steamboats on the river, until at last it found its destination, perhaps tying up at some bayou far down toward St. Louis. Once such a raft piled up on the middle pier of the Dubuque bridge, and ran up the abutmenf to the bridge floor, frightening half tc death some 300 gaping folk who had come out to see the wild men gc through. But that was merely an inci dent. It was merely an incident if at night the men, asleep and forgetful of the green lights which ought to show that they were running, awoke under a volley of profanity and saw looming before them the bow of some river steamer, whose captain and pilot obfurgated them by all the saints of the river to have a better care for the observance of the law.




#### Queer Ideas of Population.





919 put. If, in a reaction in the steel business, the company's output declines to 750,000 tons, while prices fall only 25 per cent., with no reduction in operating costs, the profits are cut from \$18,000,000 to \$1,000,000.

In 1902 the steel corporation re ceived \$560,000,000 for \$,200,000 tons of products, which cost to produce \$420,000,000. It had a profit, therefore of \$140,000,000. Two years later, although its output had fallen off only 17 per cent., and the average selling price per ton had declined only 41/2 per cent. and the average cost had risen only 41/2 per cent., the profits declined to \$80,000,000, or a loss of 43 per cent. The steel corporation is now producing 10,000,000 tons a year. A variation of only five dollars a ton. or seven per cent., in the average ton price, of its product, if unaccompanied by a variation in cost, means a variation of \$50,000,000 a year in its profits. This is enough to pay ten per cent. dividends on the half billion dollars of common stock. This is why Andrew Carnegie says steel is either a "prince" or a "pauper."

### Scientific Farming of the Day.




