## SCOTTY'S RETREAT FOUND

Eccentric the Death Valley Sensation May Be, Yet He Expresses a Generous Side.

LOOKS MORE LIKE VANDALISM

The Discoverers Violate the Hospitality Extended, and as a Consequence Can Look for a Hot Reception.

HOSPITABLE CAVE EMBELLISHED

Greenwater, Sept. 18, 1906.

The deep mystery that has prevailed for so long a time as to the retreat of "Death Valley" Scotty has been thrown open to the public by those who have been induced into this country by the marvelous discoveries in this district. It may be said here that the discoverers added no laurels to their fame when they found Scotty's abiding place in the desert.

Dr. Rafael Ynchauspe Mendez, a Venezuela general, who is here prospecting in company with a man by the name of A. J. Hartford, were the two who made the descent and brought out with them the tale of the location and the mystery. It is situated in one of the deep gorges on the Death Valley slope of the Funeral range about thirty-one miles from Greenwater. It is at a junction of two canyons where they come together and where it is an impossibility to go farther and in one of the most difficult portions of the Funeral range to invade.

Scotty has a notice posted at the entrance to his cave, "Help yourself to anything to eat or drink, but don't take anything away." There are two abiding places; apparently one is a reception chamber, while the other was used by Scotty to hide in. They are close together, but the hiding place would be hard for one not accustomed to rough country as this is to locate. The walls are decorated with pictures from sporting papers, a reclining chair, two mattresses, a swinging hammock, breath perfume, and other like delicacies. In the larder there was flour, bacon, mustard, bath tub, numerous empty whiskey bottles, giant powder, fuse, caps, the latter none of which had been used or had any of the packages been broken; eleven pack saddles, a package of drill steel that was just as intact as the day it was bought in Los Angeles, and there were a great many sheets of tanglefoot fly paper scattered about.

The men gained this hiding place only by great caution, and many a time they labored under the belief that this trip was the last. Here they camped for the night, and in the morning on leaving loaded themselves and burros with everything portable. The flour and provisions they did not touch, for the reason, they say, the wild animals had gotten into it and it lay scattered and strewn about on the floor of the cave. D. Rafael says he only appropriated such articles as he considered souvenirs, but those who were along took pack saddles and many other things, together with Scotty's diary or account book, and which were brought here into Greenwater from there. It is said most of the booty from the cavern were hustled off to Tonopah and Goldfield by one of the crowd, it is said to sell if a purchaser could be found who wanted to invest in those kind of chattles.

The party had great difficulty in getting out, but after many narrow escapes they reached here with their booty. They made several locations while in there. Three on one side of the canyon and three on the other. They report that they horned some from which they obtained a color or so, but no prospects dazzling to the eye or anything that would warrant a stampede into the country. They express the opinion that Scotty has no mine, and that if he had there would have been a more liberal use of the explosives and some wear on the steel. Even laboring under this belief they made the locations of the property as described and they consider it valuable.

There is a sense of disgust pervading this camp on account of the party names; having appropriated Scotty's property to their own use, even in the face of Scotty inviting them to eat, drink, but don't take anything away. With what the party took and with what others got afterwards we are of the belief the cave has been cleaned out of everything. Scotty has some friends here and they have posted his friends on the outside, so that Scotty can be informed of what has been done with his domicile in the Funeral range, and it is predicted that there is liable to be a real hot time one of

these days and that Scotty will be a starter in the realistic dream.

No one in this district countenances or commends the acts perpetrated and the taking of Scotty's supplies and nicknacs from his home in the hills is vigorously condemned by every miner and by every prospector, citizen and old-timer as a piece of vandalism and high-handed outrage.

The following is a construction of California law as placed upon it by one of the attorneys of the county:

When a party finds a vein or lode in place carrying values, places a note of location therein and marks the boundaries of his claim so that the same can be readily traced on the ground, his claim is complete, and it is not necessary in California to record his notice unless his claim is in a mining district which requires the locator to record his claim, and even his right does not depend on the fact of recording unless the rule which provides for the recording of the notice goes farther and also provides that a failure to so record will result in a forfeiture of his claim.

In other words, if a claim is in California, and is also in an unorganized mining district, no recording is required. Still it is always advisable to record with the district recorder if there is one, and also with county recorder in every case. This, because if you ever wish to patent your claim you must be able to show a location record.

The above relates to claims in California. In reply to the second inquiry, a party has no right upon a survey, to overlap or encroach upon ground properly located and claimed by another and against a valid claim, has no right to extend his lines beyond his original monuments.

Surveyors sometimes do that, however, and the party whose ground is encroached upon has a right to adverse claim the other party when he applies for a patent in accordance with the survey.

The fact that the surveyor sat his corners out on another man's ground would not make either valid claim void, nor would it affect the title thereof of either party to the land in conflict. And as I have stated, when the party lapping over applied for a patent, the other would be obliged to begin suit in the superior court of the county in which the mine is situated, to determine the ownership of the ground in conflict. And upon the judgment rendered in such action, the patent would be granted.

If you have a claim upon which another is encroaching, I would ask him to remove therefrom and insist upon his doing so. If he persists, your remedy would be to bring suit to quiet title against him at once, or wait until he applies for a patent on the claim and then adverse him in the patent proceedings.

## INSPIRING PLATFORM.

The Democratic party of the state of Nevada, presents a platform to the people that in import befits the great charter which is the basis of the laws and liberties of the English-speaking people. A synopsis of the platform follows:

**The Platform.**  
Section 1. Rejoices in the prosperity of the nation, but deprecates the concentration of wealth.

2. Favors the election of United States senators by direct vote of the people.

3. Asks for a careful revision of tariff schedules which shall aim at the reduction or removal of duties on articles of American manufacture sold more cheaply abroad than at home.

4. Endorses rate bill adopted by the present congress and claims the step of progress as a Democratic victory.

5. Declares that the only hope of securing laws to stop aggressive policy of monopolies lies in the election of a Democratic congress.

6. Adheres to oft stated position on the money question.

7. Congratulates the people of Nevada upon the impartial and able administration of Governor Sparks.

8. Favors enactment of just and equitable Employers' Liability Act for the protection of lives and limbs of employes.

9. Endorses acts of Senator F. G. Newlands, and favors his candidacy for re-election.

10. Favors creation by law of the office of bank inspector, to protect depositors.

11. Favors enactment of laws with a view to the comfort and safety of the working man.

12. Asks that provision be made for public school instruction, advocates a practical course of study to be used throughout the state and provision of ample funds for the school and liberal salaries for teachers. Special mention is made of the State University and its needs.

13. Demands the reopening of the U. S. mint at Carson City to the coinage of gold and silver.

14. Demands establishment of terminal points by all railroads traversing the state, in conformity with the interstate commerce law.

15. Affirms that the interests of capital and labor are interdependent, and pledges the party to do all in its power to foster and protect their interests. Gives laboring men freedom to organize for the betterment of their social, educational and financial condition.

16. Stands for full protection of capital and vested property interests, encouraging the greatest possible investments in our state by outside capital.

17. Endorses William Jennings Bryan for the presidency in 1908.
