COUNTY PRINTING

The Pioche Record squeals painfully because the county commissioners awarded the county printing to The Age for SIXTY PER CENT LESS than the Record has been receiving for years. As a reason why the commissioners should have continued feeding it from the public crib is the statement that it is 47 years old. The public will hardly accept dosage as an argument for paying the Record more than The Age for public service.

Section 2142 does not apply to the job printing contract, for the reason that the work will not amount to \$500 for the coming year. The Age agreed to do the job printing this year for twenty-five per cent less than rates allowed the Record last year, and it was the duty of the commissioners to award the contract to The Age.

Naturally the Record feels sore because the public pay bottle has been taken away, but the change was justified in the interest of economy.

This explanation is made because nobody in the south part of Lincoln county ever sees the Record.

WEAK WATER PIPE

The pipes laid to conduct water from the springs to Las Vegas are to weak to stand 100 feet head and have given way under the pressure. In the meantime the people are using water pumped from the creek, and there is danger in it. A few cases of typhoid fever are reported. All drinking water should be boiled.

HOTEL BARS

The injunctions to restrain certain hotels from selling liquors at Las Vegas, have been argued and briefs submitted at Pioche. The judge has the cases under consideration and a decision will not be reached for a week or more. The Age will not comment on the merits of the case while in the hands of the court. The main question involved is what constitutes a hotel.

BRICK BUILDING

W. R. Thomas states that he expects to soon commence the construction of a two-story brick building on his property at the corner of Fremont and First streets. The structure will be 45x62 feet in size.

Mr. Thomas contemplates occupying a portion of the building with a business of his own, the nature of which he declines to state at this time.

PLANT TREES

History states that the Mormons planted 400,000 shade trees in Lincoln county between the years 1860 and 1870. Most of these may now be seen at Las Vegas, Panaca and in the Muddy and Virgin river valleys. The railroad will also plant trees along the line to illustrate to passengers that the country will produce.

At Pioche, where the elevation is 6000 feet and the hills dry, box elders and locust trees flourish without much care or water. Las Vegas should make haste to plant trees this fall on all her streets. Trees temper the heat and winds and beautify city and country.

PANACA

Between Caliente and Pioche in Meadow valley lies the thrifty little town of Panaca. It is a farming community of about 150, and the farms and grazing herds of cattle remain one of "back east." Panaca was once the scene of great mining activity, in the days of 1874-5, but has settled down to farming.

TEMPERATURE

Highest temperature for the week 110. The average for several days past is but a trifle over 100.

PIOCHE

Mr. Eugene Goodrich has been appointed to the position of deputy in the office of county treasurer and clerk. He is competent and popular.

Information for gun men: Sheriff Johnson is a good shot and picks birds out of trees without effort.

At Salt Lake last week expired an old and respected pioneer merchant of Pioche A. S. Thompson. He was sixty-four years of age and died of heart failure.

The Half Moon mine near Pioche, C. S. Miller of Boston, president, is in the hands of the sheriff under attachment for debts. For some reason unexplained the attempt to reopen and operate the mine has been a failure.

Commissioner Richard Gordon of De Lamar says the great mines of that section are producing better than ever and promise to continue a stream of gold for years.

In 1874 Pioche had 6000 population and cast 1800 votes. Now the county seat has about 200 population and can't cast 100 votes. If the mines resume conditions will change somewhat.

The Ely Record, started at Pioche September 17, 1870, W. H. Pitchford & Co., was the first newspaper in Lincoln county. No editor has ever died with his boots on in Southern Nevada.

Lincoln county officers are not overpaid. Population and business have nearly doubled since they were elected.

A trip from Las Vegas to Pioche, the county seat, a distance of 155 miles by rail and stage, requires four days and costs from \$25 to \$30. From Searchlight, Good Springs or Eldorado Canyon the cost would be a little bit more. Witnesses in criminal cases get no expenses on visits to the county seat. Is it any wonder there is a demand for a county seat at Las Vegas?

BUTLER'S FIRE

The Los Angeles Times of August 16 contains the following, which will interest the Las Vegas friends of Roy G. Butler:

"One of the most prominent of the troubles (financial) at Las Vegas is that in which R. G. Butler was involved. The word 'was' is used advisedly, for Butler has now 'cut it out,' and is far from the place of his troubles.

"Butler was a furniture dealer, with a \$5,000 stock, furnished mostly by Los Angeles houses. He carried an insurance on the stock for only \$2,000. One evil day the furniture store was burned out. Butler had deposited his insurance policy with a bank at San Francisco as collateral security on an account. The insurance adjuster came on, and Butler offered to discount the amount due if immediate payment was made, instead of his having to wait the time allowed by law. The insurance company was to take up the amount at San Francisco, and pay Butler the balance of the money. It did so, but Butler forgot his Los Angeles creditors, and cannot now be located.

"He leaves accounts of over \$900 in Los Angeles, and \$1000 in Salt Lake."

The business of the Cope-Shepherd Lumber Company has been turned over to the Southern California Lumber Co., as trustee. Mr. E. M. Marshall, an experienced lumber man, represents the trustee at Las Vegas.

B. R. Jefferson, who has been prospecting on the Colorado river at the mouth of the Vegas wash, says there is good fishing in the river. The lower elevation increases the heat to 120 degrees.

A. Russell Crowell left Sunday for California to enjoy a few week's vacation. He will sojourn for a period in Southern California and may possibly take a hunting trip to Mt. Whitney and vicinity.

The Age now goes to every postoffice and leading mine in Lincoln county. It will contain all official news of the county hereafter and have a wider circulation. Advertisers will do well to remember this.

Commissioner Geo. C. Baldwin, of Meaps, is the only county officer who was elected from the southern part of Lincoln county. He has a beautiful garden spot at the warm springs which are the source of the Muddy river.
