In conclusion I wish to state that outside of Pioche and DeLamar but little or no attention is paid to the Record or Lode, as virtually they are one, and everybody knows it. Therefore, anything published against Attorney Sanders recives but little if any considera-tion from the business men of Lincoln county.
