News Notes of Our Neighbors to the South

Capt. Harvey Hardy has returned from Las Vegas, at which point he purchased a team to better facilitate his work.

A. E. Thomas is back from the Crescent district, whither he went on business in connection with the Campbell estate.

Sam. E. Yount, our genial postmaster and merchant, is again acquainted with his business and working hard to reduce his waist measure to 40 inches.

W. T. Roberts, for many years a resident of this place, has gone to Los Angeles to assume management of the Southern Hotel during the absence of the proprietor, Mr. Hunsacker.

Mr. Nichols of Salt Lake City has returned to his home after a week's stay. Mr. Nichols is very much pleased with the outlook for this camp, and like every one else who visits us, was perfectly delighted with our hotel service. Mrs. Yount never had a dissatisfied person leave her house, and under her personal supervision the Good Springs Hotel is the best in the State of Nevada.

The Good Springs and Bullfrog stage line has an excellent service and is crowded with passengers in both directions. The public are quick to learn the most direct and pleasant routes over the desert, and the growing patronage of the stage line shows that they approve this route. Easy riding conveyances, accommodating drivers, good roads and water, no night travel, with a rest at White's Ranch (Manse), is the reason why the Good Springs route to Bullfrog is so much in public favor.

Col. W. H. Wilson is expected home in a few days when the contract will be let for the smelter. John M. Carter, for many years connected with the late W. G. Campbell in his mining operations in the west, was a visitor here this week. This was Mr. Carter's first visit to this district and he was so well pleased with the mineral appearance that he took several properties under contract and expects to begin operations on some of them at once.

The Red Cloud mine, property of Mr. Chas. Byram, is nearly ready to start the new hoist, and will soon be putting ore through the cyanide process. The ore is in large body and of high grade.

The owners of the South Red Cloud will begin development work on their ground next week, when it is expected that a good showing will be made.

The bond on the Chiquita mine has been taken up, a wagon road graded to the mine and ore shipments will be made regularly from now on. Watch for the returns on this ore—it may surprise you.

Work is to be resumed on the Hoosier very soon and ore shipments from that property will be a regular thing hereafter. These last three properties are under the management of Capt. Hardy. J. F. Kent has gone to Los Angeles on business connected with his mining property and expects to return in two weeks and begin operations.

Work on the Grand View mine will be begun on the 15th. This is a lead-silver property and belongs to the Toledo Mining and Smelting Co., and will be under the supervision of P. H. Springer, vice-president.

Mr. Merrill, who is gathering data for his new book, "Mines and Mining as Seen by a Tenderfoot," visited us today and was much pleased with the district. Mr. Merrill is an eastern man, but says that Nevada has won him and hereafter his residence will be among us. He is a newspaper man of large experience, and what will be a loss to his former State (Nebraska) will be a gain for us. We welcome you, brother Merrill, and wish you success in your undertakings, even greater than you expect.

ONE CHURCH

The M. E. Conference has appointed Rev. Dr. Bain to Vegas, and the Presbyterian organization, realizing that there is not room for two churches, has gracefully withdrawn from the field.

The Presbyterian church was organized in April by Dr. Noble and has since been conducted by Rev. Robinson. Mr. Robinson left Tuesday to carry on his work in other fields, but hopes to return later, when he feels that the community is able to sustain another church.
