HOTEL CASES

Set For Trial By Jury To Commence October 20

Las Vegas hotel cases, wherein the hotels were sought to be enjoined by Las Vegas Land and Water Co. from dispensing liquor in their establishments, will be tried in the District Court October 20th.

Hugh Percy, attorney for J. S. Wisner, one of the defendants, moved for a jury trial, which motion was strongly opposed by C. O. Whittemore, counsel for the company. After hearing arguments the Court granted the motion and the case will be tried before a jury. Hotel keepers have been delaying contemplated improvements on account of the filing of this suit against them.

MISTAKE CORRECTED

Las Vegas Mercantile Co. Placed in False Light

An item appearing in last week's Age was written as to reflect on the probity of Las Vegas Mercantile Co., and The Age is only too glad to have an opportunity to correct this wrong impression. The item stated that the attachment of the Mercantile Co. and others was levied on property mortgaged to the Beatty Bank and Trust Co., whereas such was not the case, the attachment having effect only on property that was open to attachment proceedings under the law. The Age item was meant only to call attention to the peculiar provisions of a Nevada sheriff's court and intended no reflection on the Mercantile Co.

This paper has had business connections with the last named company and has every reason to respect its officers and stockholders. Las Vegas Mercantile Co. is one of the substantial business concerns of Southern Nevada, and so far as The Age knows conducts its business in an honorable and straightforward manner.

The item above referred to is a report of the attachment case against F. J. Porter, which was tried before Deputy Sheriff Murphy Sept. 23rd.

STATE NEWS

Items of Interest From Various Exchanges

The Government Geological surveyors have fixed the altitude of Bullfrog at 3,573 feet above sea level.

Mina, the new railroad town, is building up fast. It has three grocery stores, two barber shops and several saloons. A hotel is almost completed.

The Tonopah Mining Co. has let a contract for the construction of a 100-stamp mill at Millers, fourteen miles northwest of Tonopah on the Tonopah railroad.

On October 1st the Goldfield postoffice was made a Presidential office of the second class, the salary being \$2,400 a year. Goldfield is now the largest post-office in Nevada.

Charles Buell, an old-time miner and prospector of Storey county, dropped dead on the street in Virginia City on Tuesday afternoon of last week. Heart failure was the trouble.

Harry Brown, an old and highly respected Reno officer, died at his home in Reno last week from blood poisoning, caused by an injury received some weeks ago while arresting a man.

On the Riley lease on the Florence mine at Goldfield ore going \$12,000 per ton is being taken out of a five-foot ledge. At least \$1,000,000 worth of ore is now stacked on the dump ready for shipment.

Thirty thousand volts of electricity is now conveyed across the desert to Tonopah from Bishop Creek, Cal., a distance of over 100 miles. This large volume of fluid energy was turned into Tonopah at 5 o'clock Thursday evening of last week.

Pioche has a graveyard in which there are buried thirty men who died with their boots on between the years of 1870 and 1874. About 100 murders have been committed in the county since 1870 and only one man was hanged, Hank Parish, who was executed in Ely, in 1892.

The property of the Chairman Mining Company, of Ply, White Pine county, has been sold by U. S. Marshal Grimmon to satisfy a judgment of \$14,000. The property was bid in by the Salt Lake Hardware Company for \$15,000. The mill alone cost over \$150,000.

The Board of Paroles, in executive session at Carson, after considering the applications for a commutation of sentence of Gorman, Roberts and Severyn, the condemned murderers of Jack Welch, denied the application of Gorman and Severyn and granted that of Parols.

The Lyon County News says it is rumored that the Rocky Point mill and Nevada Reduction Works of Yerington have been bonded to a New York syndicate for the sum of \$175,000. It is also reported that the company contemplates running a tunnel from Dayton to Silver City to drain the mines in that vicinity and extract the low grade ores known to exist in large quantity.
