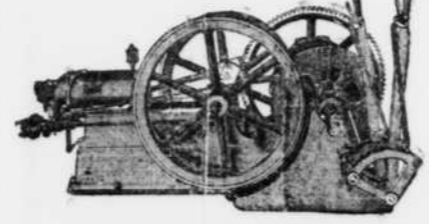

CALIENTE

The Salt Lake Railroad is the backbone of Caliente. The community has developed to the proportions warranted by the railroad payroll and appears to be satisfied to remain within this limit.

About 250 men have been employed by the railroad during the past year. Construction work is about completed. The permanent payroll will probably not exceed 100.

Caliente is situated in a small valley almost completely surrounded by hills. There is but a limited area adapted to townsites purposes, yet no lots have sold for \$100 per front foot.

The railroad company has erected a couple of dozen cottages for the use of its employees. The buildings are aligned in a monotonous row, the same as army barracks. The precise line of uniform closets in the rear loom up conspicuously from the main business street.

Denton Heights is the latest addition to the community. Several small dwellings have recently been erected there.

Col. Jimbrown and his weekly comic paper keep the natives from lapsing into a state of complete ennui.

The stage lines to the county seat connect only with trains from and for the east. Citizens of the county who have occasion to visit Pioche must lay over in Caliente about 18 hours going and coming, or else hire a special conveyance.

It is snowing a little here today, Nov. 5th. Snow seldom stays long on the ground in the valley, but in the mountains and even in the low hills it often remains all winter. Early snow is most likely to remain.

Caliente now has the finest school house in Lincoln county. It is built of native stone with walls 21 inches thick. The building is one story in height, containing two good-sized rooms, with a seating capacity of about sixty pupils. The cost to the community was about \$7,000, which was raised by a special tax levy.

CIRCULARS AND THINGS

The De Lamar Lode says, "We learn that the 'American Type Founder Trust' has a small printing plant at Vegas, all packed and ready to run into Nye county, or if they see fit, to start another 'circular' in Lincoln."

It is to be hoped that the Lode will keep on "learning" until it finally learns to tell the truth.
