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WATER SYNDICATE

The stockholders of the Vegas Artesian Water Syndicate held a meeting Thursday afternoon for the purpose of completing organization and transacting general business.

The officers report that subscriptions for stock are beginning to come in from non-residents, and the success of the venture seems assured.

A proposition was received offering to provide the company with a well-drilling rig, payment for same to be made largely in stock.

A San Francisco broker guaranteed to market all the stock of the syndicate now for sale, but the directors refused the offer, preferring to make the organization, as nearly as possible, a home institution.

The syndicate is receiving considerable encouragement from both resident and non-resident land owners.

JUSTICE COURT

The suit of James Sanderson for preferred claim on an attachment against the S. G. Berrie saloon property was tried in Justice Ralph's court Wednesday. Attorney Dan V. Noland, who instituted the attachment proceedings, was made co-defendant with Berrie, and conducted defendant's case, Hugh Percy representing the plaintiff.

Sanderson's claim was for wages, and Berrie desired to confess judgment and save costs, but was not allowed the privilege, and the case went to trial. After hearing the evidence, the justice took the case under advisement.

The decision of the court, which has since been made, denies the preferred claim and awards judgment to the plaintiff on the confessed judgment, and assesses plaintiff with the costs. Plaintiff will appeal to the District Court.

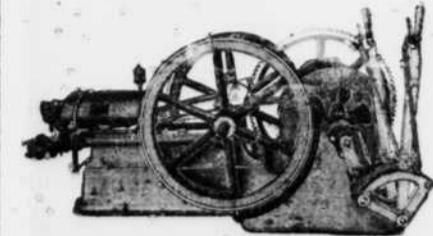

STATE NEWS

Items Garnered From Various Papers Throughout the State

Important discoveries of nickel are reported in Nevada, about forty miles from Lovelock, on the Southern Pacific railroad.

Reports of rich strikes in the regions north and east of Tonopah are coming in so fast that it is hard to keep track of them. Great is Nevada!—Bonanza.

It is said that Sam Davis will be a candidate for Governor. He will make no attempt to secure the nomination, but if it is tendered him, unanimously by the Republican, Democratic and Silver parties he will condescend to accept, believing that with those nominations he can defeat the prohibition candidate.

The smelter conditions remain unchanged, nearly every smelter in the country being choked with Tonopah ores. Coke is also hard to get and the smelters are greatly handicapped in this respect.

Goldfield now has a Western Union telegraph office, and all messages addressed to Goldfield go by direct wire. The rate has been reduced from 45 cents for ten words to 40 cents.

Colonel Hopkins, of Searchlight, has been urged to launch his castor into the political ring for senatorial honors. Many of the Colonel's admirers believe he can win and of course the G. O. P. wants some one who can furnish the sinews of war, and it is said the Colonel has money to throw to the birds.

MURDERERS HANG

Ezra Roberts, J. P. Sevener, T. S. Goffman and Frank Linderman, alias Williams, were hung Friday at the State Prison in Carson. The men were hung in pairs as the gallows will only accommodate two men at a time. The crime for which the men were executed was the murder of Jack Welch in Humboldt county two years ago. Strenuous efforts were made to save these men from the gallows, but the Board of Pardons, after twice reviewing the testimony and listening to many arguments, refused to interfere with the sentence of the court.

STATE IS PROGRESSING

State Billions and Tax-Agent Nevins came over from Reno this morning, says Monday's Carson News. He says the State is more prosperous today than ever before in its history. All the fourteen sheriffs are doing their duty in the matter of collecting revenues. The Reno gambling games alone pay into the State treasury \$100 a day.
