NEAL ARRESTED

Charged With Embezzling Goods From Railroad Co.

S. G. Neal, former warehouse foreman of the Salt Lake railroad at Las Vegas, was arrested Tuesday evening by Deputy Sheriff Murphy, charged with embezzlement.

The preliminary hearing was held before Judge Ralph Thursday, and Neal was bound over to appear before the grand jury at the latter part of this month. Dan V. Noland represented the railroad company as attorney. Neal employed no attorney. In default of \$2000 bond Neal went to jail.

Age readers remember the robbery of cigars and liquors some time ago from the railroad company, for which Spiker and Hawley are now serving two and three years.

The goods recovered in the above case were returned to the warehouse in charge of Neal, and it is alleged he sold them to parties in Las Vegas during the latter months of 1905. Sheriff Murphy had placed his private mark on the goods and they were easily identified.

S. G. Neal is a man of probably thirty years of age, and has just returned from an eastern trip.

CRESCENT MINES

Several Properties Develop Into Shippers of Good Ore

At Crescent the prospects are developing into mines rapidly. The Big Tiger has a great low grade ledge. The property was recently purchased by Mr. J. K. Sword, of British Columbia. J. L. Bank is superintendent. A custom mill will be erected at the Big Tiger.

Ore running from \$50 to \$80 has been struck in the Lucky Dutchman. The shaft is down 80 feet and 15 men are employed at the works.

The Double Standard owned by Dennis Sullivan and others, is down 100 feet in silver-lead ore, which will be shipped to Salt Lake. Thomas A. Irvin of Nipton is manager.

The Red Star and Mogul both have good gold prospects.

The Nippeno mine is sacking \$300 ore for shipment. It is down 175 feet and employs 12 men.

Spring Here and Trees Will Soon Bloom

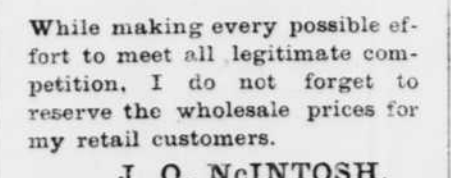
COLONY SCHEME

GOOD SPRINGS

Smelter and Townsite Boom Launched Again

From various sources we learn that a party of Eastern capitalists are launching at Good Springs a smelter enterprise, attached to which is a townsite boom.

Reports from Salt Lake and Los Angeles mention the arrival of Eastern capitalists interested in the Good Springs Smelting and Developing Co., which intends to locate a smelting plant near Good Springs, Lincoln County, on the Salt Lake railroad.

THE COMPANY

The company was recently incorporated under the laws of Massachusetts and is known as the Good Springs Smelting and Developing Company, the capital stock of which is \$500,000. The officers of the company are: President, A. H. Gates, Chicago; vice-president, George W. Hinckley, Boston; secretary, D. D. Keating, Haverhill, Mass.; treasurer, Warren W. Potter, Haverhill; directors, W. E. Geanott, Bangor, Maine; R. S. Hardy and W. H. Wilson, of Los Angeles, and C. H. Raymond of Haverhill. The principal offices of the company will be at Los Angeles.

THE OBJECT

The purpose of the corporation is to build a large smelter, a general merchandise store, residences and to establish a bank at Good Springs, which is 38 miles south of Las Vegas. It is the center of a productive mining district. The minerals are gold, silver, copper and lead, the latter furnishing the tonnage and the silver the values. At Los Angeles the party will meet Joseph Dedericks, engineer and contractor and he will accompany to Good Springs and take up the actual work of construction. Operations are to begin at once. The smelter will be at work with the least possible delay. We presume the movement means the revival of the old smelter at Good Springs, which has long been idle.

CHURCH BUILDING

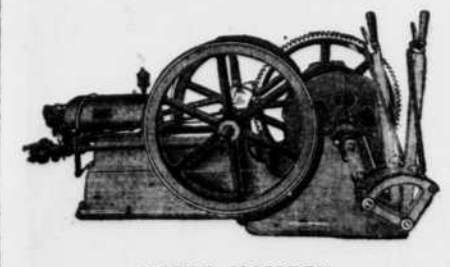
