HIDDEN TREASURE

Hon. W. T. Miles, and other Chicago capitalists, have purchased the Hidden Treasure mine on Virgin River in Lincoln county east of Las Vegas and will put in a fifty ton stamp mill. During the past year ten carloads of high grade gold ore have been shipped from this mine. \$40,000 was paid down on the purchase and \$36,000 will be paid in sixty days.

COMMISSIONERS' MEETING

The Board Gets Together and Transacts Business.

The Board met Monday, February 5th, 1906. Commissioners Gordon, Baldwin and Nabitt and Clerks Eugene Goodrich present.

Minutes of the meetings of December 4th and 11th, 1905, and January 8th and 15th, 1906, read, approved and signed by the Chairman of the Board.

Reports of all county officers for the month of December, 1905, were read and approved.

Bills for December, 1905, allowed as per Clerk's Register Claims book.

Three bills of Wm. E. Abbott for road work, for the sum of \$200, were ordered returned to have Road Inspectors sign the bills.

There being but one bid for the construction of a county bridge near Caliente, the contract was awarded to James Lamoino for the sum of \$275.

Ordered that all lots 20 to 63 inclusive, in block 33, town of Pioche, now owned by the county, be sold to A. W. Scott for the sum of \$75; also lot 53, block 25, town of Pioche, owned by the county, to be sold to A. W. Scott for the sum of \$30.

Ordered that lots 18 and 19, in block 1 of the town of Pioche, owned by the county, to be sold to Wm. E. Orr for the sum of \$60, and lots 15 and 20, in block 33, owned by the county, to be sold to Wm. E. Orr for the consideration of \$10.

Bills for the month of January as per Register Claims book were allowed.

Townsite plat of East End Addition of the town of Searchlight was presented for approval, and the plat complying with all the requirements of the law, was approved and signed by the Chairman of the Board.

The bill of A. S. Thompson Co. for stage fare of K. Marks from Caliente to Pioche was rejected for the reason that the same had not been authorized by any member of the Board.

An execution was presented issued by Wm. D. Maynard, J. P., of Caliente Township, in the case of W. J. Lee vs. Lincoln county, the judgment of court being in favor of the plaintiff for the sum of \$66 and costs of suit, amounting to the sum of \$16. The matter was laid over until the March meeting for further investigation.

On petition from residents from Crescent, Crescent School District No. 30 was formed.

An order was made that a special meeting of the Board of County Commissioners be held Monday, March 5th, 1906, for the purpose of drawing a jury list sufficient for the March term of court, and for the transaction of all regular monthly business.

The following transfers were made from the General County Fund: To the Salary Fund, \$1500; to the State Fund, \$100.

No special rate was levied for either Bunkerville or Caliente interest on school bonds.

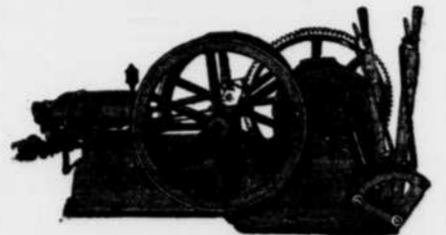
