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LAND SURVEY

Contracts Let to Sectionize Southern Nevada

A letter received from Matthew Kyle, U. S. Surveyor General for Nevada, conveys the welcome information that contracts for extending the public surveys in southwestern Nevada have been let as follows:

No. 248—Office E. Brashears, D. S., for the first and third standard parallel south, the range lines between R. 47 and 48 E. and the subdivision of Tps. 12 S., R. 45 E., 11 and 12 S., R. 46 E., 11 and 12 N., R. 47 E.

No. 250—Frank T. Roberts, D. S., for parts of the Mount Diablo Base and the first standard parallel north; the first standard parallel south from R. 47 to 52 E. and the exterior lines of Tps. 3 and 4 S., R. 47, 48 and 49 E., 1, 2, 3 and 4 S., R. 51 and 52 E., 4 and 5 N., R. 50 E., 3 N., R. 51 E., 1, 2, 3 and 4 N., R. 52 E., 4 N., R. 53 E.

No. 251—Alfredo R. Talamantes, D. S., for the second standard parallel south from R. 43 and 55 E., and the exterior lines of Tps. 5, 6, 7 and 8 S., R. 42, 43, 44, 45, 46 and 47 E. and 7 and 8 S., R. 48 E.

No. 252—Melvin D. Heist, D. S., for the third standard parallel south and the exterior of Tps. 9 and 10 S., R. 44, 45, 46 and 47 E., 11 S., R. 44, 45 and 48 E., 12 S., R. 48 E., 13 and 14 S., R. 46, 47, 48 and 49 E.

The estimated liability of these contracts amount to \$13,500, and they are to be completed within the year 1906.
