SOME GOLD

An estimate of the world's gold to end of 1905 is \$11,000,000,000. Pure gold of this value would weigh 16,500 tons and occupy a space of 30,000 cubic feet. It would represent a circular tower of gold 20 feet in diameter and 100 feet high. The yearly production of gold now will increase the height of this tower three feet each year.

Mining Laws

A correspondent is informed that where several unpatented mining locations are held in common in one district the whole expenditure of \$300 for each claim can be made on any of them. Relocation of claims forfeited through failure to comply with the annual labor law are required to sink a new discovery shaft and mark the boundaries the same as in making an original location. — Virginia Chronicle.
