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NEW OPERA HOUSE

General Plan of Structure to Be Erected Soon

Plans and specifications are on the board of Architect Chamberlain's office for a two-story block on the corner of Second and Fremont streets. The building is to be constructed of cement blocks and will consist of four office or store rooms on the ground floor, with plate glass front. The size of the building is 50x80. The second story is designed for an opera house, the floor to be level so that it can be used for dancing, socials, etc. The stage will be 24 feet wide and 16 feet deep. On the side of the auditorium are arranged four anterooms, to be used for lodge purposes, and in the wings are provided ample dressing rooms and toilet.

The plans will be given out for competitive bids in a few days.

LECTURE ON EGYPT

Rev. Dr. Van Deventer, presiding elder of the Nevada district, Methodist church, gave an interesting lecture on Egypt in the school house on Friday evening. It was not as well attended as a boxing match would have been, but the small audience was appreciative.

The lecturer said that Egypt had a civilization 10,000 years before Christ; that the Pyramids were the tombs of the ancient kings; that the climate resembles Southern Nevada; that the river Nile has been dammed at a cost of \$12,000,000 and irrigates 1,600,000 acres of land, which shows Egypt to be in advance of us in irrigation. The lecture was marred by the old fable about God dividing the waters of the Red Sea to show the children of Israel to escape from the hosts of Pharaoh.

SCHWAB AT BEATTY

Buys Great Mines, Beatty Townsite, Waterworks and Hotel

The Beatty Bullfrog Miner says: In an interview with Chas. M. Schwab he admitted he had bought all of Mr. Montgomery's holdings connected with the Shoshone and Polaris mines, including the water-rights on the Amargosa and the Beatty townsite. With such a man at the head of affairs Beatty will become the camp of the Bullfrog district. His influence will bring railroads, mills, smelters and capital.

CLARK WINS
United States Senator Clark of Montana won the case against him in the Supreme Court of the United States, in which the Government sought to have canceled patents to 11,400 acres of public lands in Montana, which were alleged to have been fraudulently secured. The opinion in the case was delivered by Justice Holmes, and upheld the decision of the Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit. Justice Harlan and Brown dissented.

DEEP CRATER
To the north of the stage road to Beatty, near Miller's Well No. 1, the traveler can see a butte probably 500 to 1,000 feet high. On its summit is a depression showing evidence of former volcanic action. A prospector who had visited the extinct volcano told the writer that a deep shaft-like crater exists in the depression, with walls of slaggy substance. No bottom can be seen and a stone cast into the volcanic shaft can be heard bounding from wall to wall for several minutes, indicating great depth. The oldest Indian on the desert don't remember when this volcano went out of business.
