MUDDY RIVER

Interesting Agricultural and Mining Notes

[Special Correspondence.]

St. Thomas, March 20, 1906.

Early vegetables, such as radishes, onions, lettuce, asparagus, etc., are now being shipped to Salt Lake markets. Cantaloupe planting is on in earnest.

Better roads and a more equal distribution and economical use of water is the order of the day through the valley.

We have in the near vicinity the largest and most valuable deposits of magnesite in the United States, if not in the world, for which a deal is now pending with a New York hydro-carbon company for \$250,000. This immense deposit is cut by a deep gorge exposing a perpendicular front about 200 feet in height.

The St. Thomas Mining District is slowly but surely coming to the front. Eighteen miles easterly from St. Thomas is the recent big copper strike owned by Keese Gerard, H. Gentry and Levi Syphus. The work on this immense cropping of high grade copper ore so far indicates that it is going down and is a bonanza. About 5 miles east of this is the group of copper claims owned by F. Barrelier, L. Syphus and H. Gentry. Ex-Senator Kerns, of Salt Lake, has taken a bond on these claims and work will commence immediately under the management of Mr. Walder. A carload of machinery and supplies will be in Moapa in a few days for that purpose.

A little further east are the noted Copper Gulch and Savanae mines, which have shipped many hundreds of tons of high grade ore by way of St. George to Modena, 150 miles.

At Granite Springs the Gold Butte Mining Co. is working a small force of men preliminary to more extensive development work in the near future. This company has prospects showing values in free gold as high as \$500 per ton. Mr. Gibbs is directing operations at this camp.

Adjoining this property on the south Mr. Sharp, of Tucson, Arizona, has done location work on about 20 claims, from which some very rich milling ore has been taken. Mr. Sharp has opened a general merchandise store where wet goods galore are also dispensed.

About two miles south of Granite Springs is the west or lower end of Cedar Basin, where the first gold in this district was discovered by Frank Burgess in a strong ledge cutting the formation and running due east and west, known as the Blain mine. A 60-foot shaft has been sunk from which a good grade of free milling ore is taken. Over the summit, 13 miles south of Cedar Basin, is Jumbo Basin, where are found a number of quartz ledges which show good values in gold, silver, copper and lead, assays of \$100 per ton having been obtained from samples taken from the surface.

Finance Mine, in this Basin, with about 100 feet of work done, shows ore rich enough and in quantity sufficient to justify the erection of reduction works of some magnitude.

Without exaggeration this section for 20 miles long and 10 miles wide is heavily mineralized, and if ledges and surface indications do not fail it is destined to become one of the greatest mining districts in this State.
