### DEATH VALLEY

#### Patsy Clark's Copper Mine in Funeral Range

Monday last Patsy Clark returned from his copper prospect in Funeral Range. The shaft is down 100 feet in a good body of copper ore. Mr. Clark has ordered a hoist to sink several hundred feet. About fifteen men are employed at the mine, which promises to become a producer. Death Valley and Funeral Range have numerous good mineral prospects in course of development.

### THE OPENING

### GOOD ASSAYS

Smith & Hecker report more good assays during the past two weeks than have been had during the whole year previous.

From the El Dorado canyon district comes good specimens bearing gold, silver and copper; from the Charleston mountains zinc-lead ore, and from the Funeral Range copper and gold. Crescent has provided some good gold assays.

Much prospecting is now being done by men who know or when they see it. Indications are that there will be some remarkable developments in this section.

### INCORPORATION

Las Vegas should be incorporated for many reasons. Ordinances adapted to local conditions are badly needed and there are other matters demanding attention that can be handled successfully only by a local government.

Las Vegas has passed beyond the camp stage and is developing into a progressive town. It is time to incorporate.

### THE LUCKY STRIKE

This promising lead prospect in the Charleston mountains was discovered about January 1st, 1906, by Jacob Holcomb. The present owners are Messrs. Holcomb, C. P. Squires, Chris. N. Brown and Al. Seibert.

Some development work has been done, resulting in a good showing. The work will no doubt be continued.

### TELEGRAPH DEPARTMENT

Commencing April 1st, the Pacific Telegraph Co. has contracted to establish a brokers' leased line by way of Las Vegas. This wire was formerly operated by the Western Union via Reno. The Pacific at Las Vegas will give the brokers a quicker repeating service than the Reno office. The Western Union received \$62,000 a year for the service.

### THE POTOMI

J. T. McWilliams returned Monday from a visit to the Potomi mine and adjacent country and says that the business-like operations at the mine are good to behold.

Arden, on the Salt Lake, 10 miles south of Las Vegas, is the shipping point for the Potomi. From Arden to the mine is a distance of 20 miles.

Manager W. E. Smith also came in Monday. He makes frequent trips to Las Vegas, where supplies are purchased.

# CLARK RAILROAD

## Officers Interviewed Concerning Extension

J. Ross Clark, president and general manager, and C. O. Whittemore, vice-president and attorney of the Las Vegas and Tonopah railroad, accompanied by Malcolm Macdonald and F. A. Keith, came in from Bullfrog yesterday afternoon, and after having lunch went on to Tonopah.

Mr. Clark and Mr. Whittemore have been in the southern camp looking over the ground for the most feasible route for their line to enter the mining region. Considerable time was devoted to this matter and the conclusion finally reached to run the line through Gold Center, Beatty and over the high line into Rhyolite. In this way practically all of the larger mines are touched or will be close enough to the road to do away with long hauls.

When seen by a Review representative Mr. Clark said: "We expect to have the line finished and in service not later than the first of May, and we also expect to start out with a good freight traffic. The line, which has been completed from Las Vegas to Indian Springs, is handling a great deal of freight and a large number of passengers are being hauled."

When asked regarding the extension of his road from Bullfrog to Goldfield and then on to Tonopah, he said that no definite action had as yet been taken and would not be considered until after the line had been completed into Bullfrog.—Goldfield Review.

Since this week's serious washouts on the Salt Lake road men and material have been taken from the Las Vegas and Tonopah to assist in repairing the damage. This will retard the progress of the new line—to what extent cannot now be determined.

N. L. Davis, a conductor on the L. V. & T., had a foot badly crushed while switching at Corn Creek Sunday night. Dr. Roy W. Martin, chief surgeon of the new road, took his patient to Los Angeles Monday, where an effort will be made to save the injured member from amputation.

# GREAT SMELTER

## To Be Built Near San Francisco Immediately

Guggenheim and others of the Smelting trust have arrived to arrange plans for making San Francisco the greatest smelting center in the world, says the S. F. Journal of Commerce, and ores from everywhere will be brought here for reduction.

### BIG PLANT

"We have bought several hundred acres at San Bruno Point," said Mr. Guggenheim last night, "and we shall build at once a smelter, capacity of 45,000 tons a month, similar to one building at Goldfield Beach, Utah. The capital, including the money to work the plant, will approximate \$5,000,000. We will make this one of the greatest smelting centers of the world."

### LOW GRADE ORES

"Many low grade ores which formerly could not be worked can be handled profitably by modern methods. Copper will be the base, but we shall bring in Nevada ores for reduction. This will be a regular commission smelter."

"Under the new arrangement \$20 ores can be shipped with profit. We have entered into a twenty-five year contract with Charles M. Schwab to smelt all his ores."

"The anticipated trouble with Mr. Schwab has disappeared and peace prevails."

### BUNKERVILLE

#### Rio Virgin Goes on Rampage and Washes Out Dams

Spring is here at last in this land of sunshine and flowers; gardens are seen on all sides, and fresh lettuce, radishes and onions are ready for the table, but we are too far from the railroad to market them.

We have had some nice refreshing rains which have started the grain and grass on the hills, and alfalfa is looking fine.

A heavy flood came down the Rio Virgin a few days since and washed out the Bunkerville and Mesquite dams, but a force of men and teams are put- them in repair and we will soon have water again.

E. Bunker, Jr., has put out 40,000 to 50,000 seedless grape cuttings in the raisin farm.

The new school house is so nearly completed that the schools have moved in and will hold the last month's session in the new quarters.

J. J. Earl is doing the assessing in Bunkerville and Mesquite this year.

### SEARCHLIGHT

The Cyrus Noble is now sinking for the 1,000 foot level. The entire bottom of the shaft is in ore. The new electric plant is installed and everything is moving with precise regularity.

The Searchlight Parallel is following its usual system on the 400 foot level in order to catch the ore shoot that gives such good results on the 300 foot level.

The Duplex Mining Co. is now installing two new hoists, and a cyanide plant.

The Quartette disclosed excellent free gold ore running about \$60 per ton in crosscutting on the 900 foot level. The ledge was found and the crosscut which is now 15 feet has not yet disclosed the extent of the ledge.

The parties projecting railroads from the Santa Fe and Salt Lake railroads are endeavoring to compromise on one road and the same route. No definite conclusion has yet been reached.

### EL DORADO CANYON

The Black Hawk Co. is now working three shifts on the main shaft. When the new 10-stamp mill is completed this property will be a producer.

The bond of \$50,000 on the Mountain group has been taken up by Messrs. Gresh and Roberts. The new owners propose to develop the property extensively.

Considerable activity is manifested in this district at present and prospects are good for the development of many producing properties in the near future.

### SMITH COMING

Borax Smith, president, and several stockholders of the Tonopah and Tidewater railroad are expected to go over the line of the new road about April 1st, from Tonopah south.

Advices from Supt. Ryan's office state that building is progressing steadily.
