ELDORADO CANYON

[Special Correspondence.]
The Techatticup mine is down 550 feet on an incline and is the deepest shaft in camp and has good ore on the bottom. This belongs to the Wharton group of gold mines and is one of best claims in the group, of which there are sixteen.

Mr. L. H. Harris is sinking on his mines three miles east, and is down 65 feet and has 8 feet of ore on the bottom. He has several promising claims but is only working on one.

Mr. Jake Storer has a group of claims north of Six-Dollar Mountain and near the Harris claims that look remarkably well, showing a ledge 10 feet in width of very high grade ore only 20 feet down.

S. Bergman has bonded several claims south of Six-Dollar Mountain to Dull Bros, that are showing up wonderfully well for the work done. Work will now be pushed on these claims with vigor.

Jas. Bone has a group of claims north of Techatticup Hill that in Colorado would be considered great mines. The last shipment to Needles smelter went better than \$150 per ton.

Mr. Clark M. Alvord has a number of claims in and around camp and is making arrangements to build a small mill and take the money out, as he has very high grade ore and plenty of it. Mr. Alvord is like all the rest in this camp, he is not trying to sell.

The Black Hawk M. & M. Co. is doing a lot of work in the upper part of the camp. They have a 10-stamp mill on the ground and are only waiting for water. A contract is let to sink 250 feet on the Rand, and as that claim has water in the ledge it will no doubt furnish water enough. Mr. C. E. L. Gresh is general manager for this company. He has taken up several other properties in the camp and has already made some very good finds.

Mr. Humphreys has a group of claims north of the Wall Street that are looking well and he is making arrangements to sink his 150-foot shaft 100 feet deeper. He is buying a cable to sink still deeper and does not want to sell.

MUDDY RIVER
Heavy Storm Does Much Damage
Overton, Nev., March 30, 1903.
Weather cloudy today threatening another storm. The storm of Sunday and Sunday night in the surrounding country brought down the largest flood for 12 or 15 years. It took out all the bridges in the Muddy valley and one or two in the canyon between here and the upper valley, so that travel has to go around through the hills to get to Moapa, and we hear that ten railroad bridges in the Meadow Valley wash were taken out and that it will take two weeks to replace them.
John M. Lytle has been employed by Cobb Bros., of Moapa, to build a lodging house for them, and will commence work next week.
Shipment of vegetables has been stopped owing to the washouts on the railroad. No mail has been received from Salt Lake for over a week.
Mrs. Emma J. Kornud and sister, Ella Jones, came in Tuesday from the the Vegas, where they have been employed in the Lincoln Hotel.
C. E. Smith is at St. Thomas surveying the tillable land of that place so he can report to the State Engineer all the land in cultivation in the valley.
Stephen R. Whitehead and brothers have bought the Chas. Cobb store of this place, and Mr. Stephen Whitehead will soon bring his family here from St. George to reside. MUDDY.

GOOD SPRINGS
B. S. Hermon, of Utah, who is connected with Mr. Deitrich in the construction of the smelter, has located a very valuable deposit of zinc two miles south of town. The ground covered by his location lies alongside the old Ivanpah road and has never been prospected because gold did not stick out as big as a hen's egg. Work will be started at once and the ground thoroughly prospected under his personal supervision.
Judge Burton, of Salt Lake, has been in camp several days looking at property.
Mr. C. H. Schue, of Salt Lake, who is operating the Bonanza Hill property, has gone home for a few days. While here this week he took over several properties, among which are the Columbia extension, on which work has already begun. This property is on the same lead as the famous Columbia mine and has great promise. Mr. Schue is represented in this district by the old veteran miner-pro prospector, Capt. Harvey Hardy.
John M. Fisher, of the Columbia mine, paid us a short visit and looked over his property, a promising copper proposition. Ore bodies are encountered at every opening. So far the work consists of tunnels and the ore taken out is being piled on the dump awaiting the completion of the smelter.
J. F. Kent is installing a hoist on his property and the work of sinking will be resumed next week. This is the property on which a 5x7-foot shaft has been sunk to the 100-foot level all in ore.
Henry Robbins, of Salt Lake, reports satisfactory results on his property south of Good Springs, where he is taking out large tonnage of high grade lead-zinc ore.
The Red Cloud is in full operation and 20 tons of ore per day is being successfully treated by the cyanide process.
C. H. Raymond, assistant general manager of the smelter company, was here this week looking over the works. Wood is now being hauled and the ground prepared for a brick yard. A large number of brick will be required in the construction of the smelter and it is the intention to burn them on the ground.
The hotel is full of people and the store putting out lots of goods. Mr. and Mrs. Yount are very busy, but not too busy to treat every one kindly and make them feel at home.
