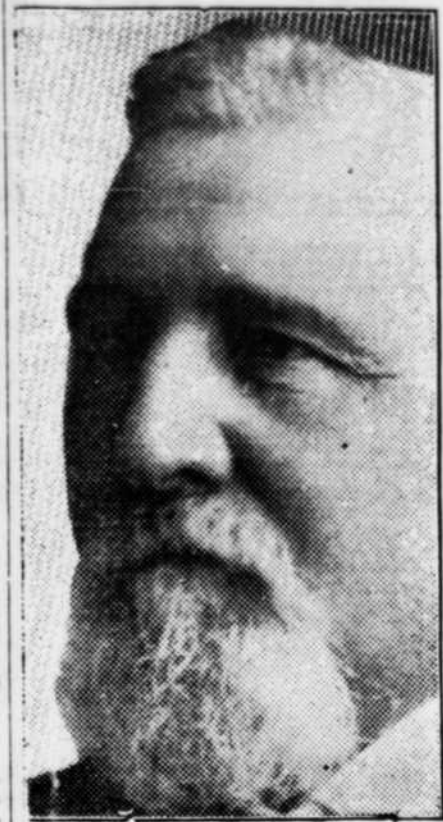
The landlady sighed as the prospective boarder picked his way down the dark stairs.

## CONTRACT WITH A SULTAN.

How Mrs. Reader Accomplished a Successful \$5,000,000 Deal.
