WATER TANKS: W. F. Worrell has just completed two 200-gallon water tanks or troughs for J. S. Wiley, who employs 100 head of horses and mules in hauling ore from the Petrosi mine to the railroad. The troughs will be placed at intervals along the road to relieve the thirsty teams on their trips. Water will be piped to the troughs from springs in the vicinity.

FIREMEN'S BALL: There will be a big crowd and a good time at Apkin's hall next Tuesday evening, when the firemen will entertain the people of Las Vegas with a grand ball.

SHOULD BE REMOVED: It would add much to the appearance of our town were a general cleaning up and clearing out of a number of old tenement houses now occupying several of the city lots to be made. A number of such buildings have been neglected by their owners and are gradually going to ruin, most of them being cheaply constructed and having been erected by people who came here in the rush last year, expecting to amass a fortune in a few short months. Those who have faith in the future of the town are putting up substantial business houses and residences, and there is but little demand for the cheap class of boom-day tent houses. As a large number of very creditable buildings have been erected here during the past three months, it would be well were the old make-shifts removed in order to show those who come among us the town is assuming an air of permanency and stability.

ARDEN: At Arden, 10 miles south of Las Vegas, there is a boozing mill, a blacksmith shop and a dozen tents. One can buy a drink of whiskey, but cannot water or feed a team.

There is hardly a section of Nevada but what will respond readily to the blow of the prospector's pick if the pick is handled intelligently. Who would have believed a few years ago that Death Valley, Funeral Range, and in fact all the hills of old Nye and Esmeralda counties contained millions of dollars of treasure that have been waiting for centuries to be picked up?

When Belmont was the chief town of Nye, stockmen on their way from the range to the county seat stumbled over the very ground that today is rich in gold and silver, almost beyond conception. The old-time settlers in Esmeralda were not a mining or speculative people. They were satisfied with what came to them naturally and without effort. When Jim Butler made the discovery of precious metals in Tonopah and startled the world with wealth never before dreamed of, he set machinery in motion that will pull the blanket off Nevada from boundary to boundary. Esmeralda and Nye are by no means all the promising fields for the miner.
