A. J. Sproles was granted a decree of divorce from Esther Sproles.

Last Tuesday no less than seven different prospecting parties, five teams and two burro outfits, passed The Age office, going out toward El Dorado canyon and the newly discovered district twenty-five miles southeast of this point. The attention of a number of prominent mining men has been directed to the large number of good prospects being located at various points in the near vicinity of Las Vegas, and they are sending their representatives and experts here to investigate matters.

The group of claims known as the Hot Card, Cold Deck and Next Turn, has been bonded to New York parties for \$60,000.

The regular quarterly meeting of the Board of County Commissioners took place Monday, April 2, 1906. Present, R. J. Gordon, chairman; J. A. Nesbitt, member, and Eugene Goodrich, clerk.

The minutes of March 5th and 19th read and approved without any corrections.

The monthly and quarterly returns of all county officers were read and approved.

A transfer of \$1000 was made from the general county fund to the salary fund.

The bills against Lincoln county for the month of March were allowed as per Register of Claims.

A bill of Benj. Harris was disallowed for the reason that in the case of the sickness of any deputy sheriff such compensation to the party acting in place of the deputy sheriff must be paid by said deputy.

The bills of J. B. Renshaw, J. L. Rhodes, W. P. Murray, E. R. Keen and Benj. Harris were not acted on pending an investigation of the several accounts, said accounts being turned over to Chas. Lee Horsey for investigation.

The judgment of W. J. Lee, issued from the Justice Court of Caliente, was again presented in revised form. After due consideration of the same the judgment of \$66.00 was ordered paid.

A petition was presented, signed by Caliente business men, asking for a further remuneration of \$110 to James Lemoin for construction of a county bridge near Caliente. As a contract was awarded to Mr. Lemoin for the sum of \$275 for the original construction of the bridge the Board had no authority to raise the price for the work done, and so voted.

A resignation of J. H. Averett was read, he being desirous of severing connections with the position of road supervisor of Virgin road district. The resignation was accepted, and upon a petition Mr. Bert Mills was appointed road supervisor of Virgin district.

F. R. McNamee appeared before the Board and asked for a price on lots 29 to 41, inclusive, block 20, and lots 23, 24, 25 and 26, block 20. The lots above mentioned are in Pioche township. They were disposed of to Mr. McNamee for the sum of \$500.

In reference to the filing of all claims against Lincoln county, the following order was adopted, to take effect immediately: "It is hereby ordered that all claims against Lincoln county be presented not later than the Saturday preceding the day of the meeting of the Board of County Commissioners (Monday). All claims that are not presented by the time as above mentioned, namely, Saturday, such claim or claims will be held over until the next meeting."

Appearing to the Board that Chas. Lee Horsey, being disqualified to prosecute the cases against Geo. O. Sawyer and H. J. Goodrich, now under indictment, for the reason that Mr. Horsey represented both defendants in the arraignment of the cases, it was ordered that F. R. McNamee be engaged to prosecute said cases, at a compensation of not more than \$500 for both cases.

Searchlight Western Telegraph and Telephone Co. is extending its line to El Dorado canyon. This should be completed in 15 days. This line will be of great assistance to El Dorado canyon, as that district is the scene of much activity at present.

A new strike has been made 150 feet north of the Venus working shaft that disclosed some excellent free gold ore.

A trench on parallel ledge has opened up ore that will average \$22 per ton, this being the general average for several feet. The Mountain group, which borders on the Venus, has a 30-foot shaft in high grade milling ore. The east drift exposes two feet of \$100 ore,
