OBITUARY

Major Horace Holt was born at Salem, Mass., Sept. 28, 1830, and spent his boyhood in and near Boston until his 20th year, when he started for California by way of Cape Horn to dig gold. He arrived in California and went to mining in the latter part of 1850. After spending about five years there he decided to return east. In the latter part of the '50s he was married, but his wife lived only two years. Soon after her death, the Civil War having commenced, he enlisted and was elected captain of his company. He went to the front and was with the Army of the Potomac through the war. During the battle of Petersburg he was wounded by a shell. At the close of the war he was a major and was mustered out and retired to private life. He drifted about in the Middle West for a time and soon joined Colonel Sibley, who was going on an expedition to Montana. There he went to mining again, and after a few years came to Utah and had claims in Beaver county. He was married there in 1884 to Mrs. Mary L. Collier, and to them was born a son, Nelson Holt, who, with his mother, still survive him. In the early part of 1888 he came to Nevada and settled in the Muddy Valley, where he lived until his death, which occurred on April 23rd, 1906. During his life he enjoyed the confidence and respect of all who knew him and at his death was mourned by all.

SEARCHLIGHT

(Special Correspondence.)

The richest strike yet made in the immediate vicinity of town was encountered in the Searchlight-Treasurer-Gold shaft yesterday. From the hanging wall at a depth of 75 feet, 4 feet of fine sugar quartz with chrysocolla thickly disseminated through it. Fluorite is also evident in the composition of the ore. The presence of chrysocolla and fluorite in this district is proof positive of great depth and strength and invariably the lodes widen as they go down.

The strike is one of the most important yet made, and the mine being right in town, the owners have purchased the mineral rights of the town itself. The booming and shock of exploding dynamite is heard and felt almost hourly on our streets, and the owners have discovered that the whole town rests on one of the richest mines of this district.

Work on the railroad grade from Barnwell to Searchlight has been started.

The largest deal made this week was the bonding of the Searchlight Northern group, owned by R. B. Sprout and P. J. Becker, for \$150,000 to J. E. Phillips, of Denver.

The Coughman property, three miles west of town, is being worked on capital furnished by Butte mining men.

The Quartette has struck ore on the 10th level.

Searchlight Western Telephone company is extending its lines to the El Dorado-Nevada, Venus, Mountain and Black Hawk groups in El Dorado canyon. Forty-two miles of wire will be needed to complete the circuit.
