### LITIGATION REVIVED

New Complaint Filed in Famous De Lamar Suit

The Utah-Nevada company has filed its second amended complaint against Joseph R. de Lamar in the suit it brought in 1902. It asks for an accounting by the defendant of the amount of capital stock of the De Lamar Nevada Gold Mining company, alleged to have produced \$13,000,000, of which De Lamar is alleged to have received \$6,000,000; also for a judgment declaring that the plaintiff is the owner and entitled to the possession of 49 per cent of the stock of the De Lamar Gold Mining company, and of the dividends and the net profits of the mining locations in Nevada set forth at length, and for costs.

The property in dispute is located in the Ferguson mining district, Lincoln county, Nevada, and includes the Monitor, Monitor No. 2, Monitor Dump, Princess, the segregated west half of the Cliff, an undivided three-fourths of the Millionaire, an undivided seven-eighths of the Lucky Bar, the whole being known as the Monitor group of mining claims.—San Francisco Chronicle.

### QUO VADIS SALE

Payment Made and Work to Commence

The initial payment of \$2,000 on the Quo Vadis bond and lease was made at the First State Bank Thursday.

This is the property frequently referred to as the Catlin claim, formerly owned by A. D. and H. C. Catlin, Robert Vincent and J. B. Anderson. The conclusion of negotiations for the sale was announced in The Age of May 19. The buyer is J. R. Phillips, of Denver, with whom is associated J. R. McKinnie, of Colorado Springs, Verner Z. Read and others.

Messrs. Phillips and McKinnie arrived from the East this week and announce that operations at the mine will commence at once. A force of men will probably be put to work today.

This is the first important deal made in the Vincent district and marks the advent of mine operators in the new field. The extent and result of the proposed operations is of importance to Las Vegas as well as to those directly interested in the mining district.

The price and terms of sale are of interest as indicating to a certain extent what the property is considered by buyer and seller.

One hundred thousand dollars is the purchase price, the lessees to receive 40 per cent of the net value of all ore removed during the period of deferred payments and to retain a permanent 10 per cent interest in the property.

Mr. Phillips will remain in Las Vegas and have charge of the development work.

### EL DORADO CANYON

Boring For Water to Run Stamp Mill

C. E. L. Gresh, representing the Black Hawk Mining company, has a ten-stamp mill at the mines in El Dorado canyon, but no water to run it.

Miners from the canyon state that a well-boring outfit has been ordered and is now on the way. If water can be secured in sufficient quantity the mill will be erected.

H. L. Harris and Jake Stoner, owners of some of the best claims in the canyon, were in Vegas after supplies this week. Mr. Harris states that all claim holders are busy developing their property. He brought in some good samples from his own claims.

Messrs. Harris and Stoner have obtained an assay of \$303.00 per ton from a silver strike recently made in the canyon. The ore also carries values in gold and copper.

### LITHOGRAPH ROCK

Deposits of Good Quality in Charleston Mountain

Fifteen miles north of Sandy, in the foothills of Charleston mountains, are deposits of lithograph stone of superior quality.

John McClanahan and others have bonded five claims to a company which will commence development in the near future.

Mr. McClanahan states that the stone has been tested and found to be perfectly adapted to lithograph purposes, which requires a stone of exceeding fine grain.

The only question now to be determined is whether slabs can be taken out of sufficient size to be useful.

The deposits are large and of immense value if proper sizes can be secured.

### Initial Wholesale Liquor House of Las Vegas

J. O. McIntosh, of the Arizona Club, has taken out a wholesale liquor license in addition to beer and malt licenses.

He now has a carload of whiskey en route from the Old Early Times Distillery, of Nelson county, Ky., and is prepared to quote prices of different grades and ages of whiskeys, in lots of one or ten barrels.

### GOOD SPRINGS

S. F. Chronicle: Charles H. Scheu, who arrived from the south in time to unite with his colleagues in exulting over the new strike in the properties of the Honorine Mining company, at Stockton, says of Good Springs, to which he is devoting much attention at this time, that it is in his opinion to be made one of the most productive of the array of camps that are to furnish the revenues and pile up dividends for the San Pedro system. Although it is but a short time since the regeneration of its diggings was begun, the results have been of a substantial nature and no fewer than five properties are at present ready to contribute to the needs of the furnaces. The Potosi is undoubtedly one of the likeliest lead, silver and zinc properties that have been opened up in the southern country, while the Shenandoah, of which Judge John W. Burton, of Salt Lake, exercises control, possesses all the attributes of a big one, with ores enough blocked out at this hour to keep the furnaces which is planned for Good Springs busy for an indefinite period. In addition to these there are the properties of the crowd by which the Chiquita and other mines are being operated, while the management of the Columbia is getting ready to begin the forwarding of copper, gold and silver-bearing ores of good quality.

While Mr. Scheu, who was one of the first to undertake the reclamation of the Honorine, would not discuss his personal undertakings at Good Springs, it is known that they are among the most important in the camp, and with them crystallized employment for a large number of persons will be provided. Of the projected smelter, he says that it is understood at camp that Mr. Deslerichs, who has the contract for the construction of it, is to push the work at once.

### GOOD SPRINGS SMELTER

Deseret News says: Joseph Deslerichs, formerly a resident of this city, but now residing in Los Angeles, arrived in Salt Lake Monday from the coast. Mr. Deslerichs has the contract for the building of the smelter at Good Springs and stated Monday that within the next ten days work upon the same would be commenced with great vigor. There are many Salt Laker who have interests at Good Springs, and news that the plant to handle their ores will soon be in process of building will be both interesting and welcome.

### AGRICULTURE

#### Hon. Frank Williams Discusses Possibilities

Hon. Frank Williams, of Good Springs, member of the State Legislature from Lincoln county, spent a day in Vegas this week upon his return from Pioche. Mr. Williams is an enthusiast upon the subject of agricultural and horticultural pursuits in Southern Nevada and believes that the people of Vegas Valley should interest themselves more in this subject. With many others, he thinks that water for such purposes can be readily secured and points to the favorable markets as an additional inducement.

While he is at present chiefly engaged with his mining interests, Mr. Williams states that as soon as his time and capital will permit him, he intends to experiment extensively along this line.

He discusses the subject with all the intelligence of one who has given it serious consideration, and with the vigor of one who believes he sees a golden opportunity going to seed.

### RAILROAD VISITORS

J. F. Dunn, superintendent of motive power of the Oregon Short Line railroad, Supt. Van Housen, of the Salt Lake division of the Salt Lake railroad, and Supt. of Motive Power Davidson, of the latter road, visited Las Vegas this week and took a trip over the new Salt Lake branch to Johnnie.

N. A. Kuhn informs The Age that Mr. Dunn, after investigating to his satisfaction, purchased a block of several thousand shares of stock in the Golden Triangle company, a home organization, with claims in the Vincent district.

### GOLD BUTTE

#### Coming to Front—Will Have Postoffice

A letter from Superintendent Gibbs, of the Gold Butte property, at Gold Butte, Nevada, to the Deseret News, contains the information that good progress is being made with development and as the tunnel is pushed into the mountain he becomes more thoroughly convinced that the Gold Butte is going to make good; that it will become a producer of magnitude.

There has been no blowing of trumpets about Gold Butte. No attempt to create a boom in this new district in southeastern Nevada has been undertaken; "nor is there likely to be," said an official of the company, "so far as the Gold Butte company is concerned. If a boom comes it will have to be on the merits of the camp, not on the strength of 'hot-air' tales, such as have characterized the beginning of some of the other western camps."

The Gold Butte has been successful in financing its proposition and nothing now stands in the way of speedy development of the company's ground.

The postoffice department at Washington has ordered the establishment of a postoffice at Gold Butte, with star route service from St. Thomas. The contract will probably be let some time in June.

The Kimberly syndicate, which has acquired territory adjoining that of the Gold Butte company, is preparing to organize a company and to commence the sinking of a permanent working shaft.
