BUNKERVILLE

[Special Correspondence]

Editor Las Vegas Age: Your live little paper is a welcome visitor, bringing its news from all parts of the county.

The people of Bunkerville have had the hardest time this year they have experienced in 25 years in trying to control the waters of the Rio Virgin in order to secure a supply for irrigation purposes. Work on the dam and ditch has cost several thousand dollars and there will be considerable loss in hay and grain crops. Previously water was taken out of the river about three miles above town, now it is taken out three miles farther up the stream.

E. Bunker, Jr., manager of the Rio Virgin Raisin and Fruit Growing company, reports everything looking fine on the farm. Last spring Mr. Bunker set out over 40,000 seedless grape cuttings, 90 per cent of which are growing.

Several parties are here buying beef cattle. I understand they are for Las Vegas and Bullfrog markets.

We are having a very cold spell of weather for this time of year the thermometer standing at 62 degrees most all day and going lower in the evening. Only a few days it was up to 88 degrees.

GOOD COPPER CLAIMS

Among the best looking copper claims in the Railroad Pass section are those of Belgen & Williamson on the east side of the pass, where the ledge can be traced for 4500 feet. Tom Williamson, who has been doing assessment work on the property, is enthusiastic over the showing and believes that here are located large medium grade copper-gold deposits that will be the making of Las Vegas. They will develop their property upon their return from abroad.

BIG OFFER REFUSED

It is stated that the Gregg Mining and Investment Co. has been offered \$200,000 above cost price for its mine at Lyons, recently purchased from Bright and Siders.

The offer was made by a representative of Los Angeles parties, and was promptly refused, with the additional statement that the mine is not for sale at any price.

HOTEL BAR CASE

The case of Las Vegas Land & Water Co. vs. J. S. Wisner has finally been decided by Judge Brown in favor of the plaintiffs, thus making the injunction against the Overland bar permanent.

The court holds that liquor cannot be sold on lots covered by the restriction clause, when it is apparent that the bar is the main feature and the hotel only a shield.

In Mr. Wisner's case, however, he has been conducting the Overland without the bar during all the months the case has been pending, and has done a profitable business. He feels that such a place is certainly entitled to be considered a hotel.

The railroad from Manvel to Searchlight will be completed about October 1st. Two hundred men are at work on the grade with about 50 teams. The terminus will be in the neighborhood of the Cyrus Noble Mining company's ground.

COMMISSIONERS

H. M. Lillis Appointed Justice for Las Vegas

The Board of County Commissioners met on June 4, 1906. Present, R. J. Gordon, chairman; J. A. Nesbitt, member; C. L. Horsey, District Attorney, and Eugene Goodrich, Clerk.

Minutes of meeting of May 7th were read and approved.

Monthly reports of all county officers were read and approved and signed by Chairman R. J. Gordon.

The bill of J. B. Renshaw, laid over from May meeting, allowed for \$98.00.

Salary bills allowed as per claims register.

General claims as per register were allowed.

A bill of J. J. Monahan was ordered returned for itemization.

A bill of A. L. Murphy was ordered returned for proper itemization.

A bill of J. J. Monahan for constable fees was rejected.

A bill of Alex Deadbeat was rejected.

A bill of Ernest Keats was disallowed.

Bills of A. Shier for \$33, Mrs. Culverwell for \$30 and W. P. Murray for \$20 were allowed over the objection of District Attorney C. L. Horsey, under section 1, page 85, Statutes of 1903, regarding regulation of contagious diseases.

Mr. John Shier appeared before the Board on indigent matters. The Board then ordered that it appearing that patients are unable to pay for their own medical attendance, or food, or medicine, the Board is legally unauthorized to make any allowance for the same, as appears in section 2 of an act to provide for preventing the spread of any contagious diseases, page 85, Statutes of 1903.

A petition from Las Vegas was presented asking for the appointment of H. M. Lillis, of Las Vegas, as Justice of the Peace of said Las Vegas township, and it appearing to the Board that since the first Monday in January, 1905, Jacob Ralph has been holding over as Justice of the Peace of Las Vegas township, and has been held by the District Court to be merely a Justice of the Peace de facto, said H. M. Lillis is hereby appointed by the Board of County Commissioners Justice of the Peace in and for Las Vegas township, to act and serve until his successor is duly elected and qualified, said successor to be elected at the next general election.

H. M. Lillis is required to qualify with a bond in the sum of \$1000.

Jacob Ralph presented a new bond of \$1000, but no action was taken on the same by the Board.

A bill of \$20 for making a bridge, presented by John Newman, was allowed on the general county fund.

In the tax matter relating to certain property in De Lamar bought from Mrs. E. Culverwell, by Sid. Alvord, it was ordered that Sid. Alvord be allowed to pay the 1905 tax on said property, together with the penalty and advertising fee of same.

Ordered that all articles of incorporation be recorded in the proper book for the sum of \$75.

Board then adjourned until date of next meeting, July 2, 1906.

RAILROAD NOTES

C. O. Whittenmore, who is in Beatty on railroad business, says the Salt Lake branch will be extended from Beatty on to Goldfield and Tonopah.

Chief Engineer Maguire tells the Beatty Miner that the railroad will positively reach Beatty by July 15th.

In addition to the Clark railroad two others are building toward Beatty. Berax Smith is building from the south and the Goldfield railroad from the north, all independent lines so far.

Ore From Canyon Nets Good Figure

Jake Stoner has received returns from the shipment of ore recently made to Phoenix, Arizona. He shipped 2100 pounds, which netted him \$288. The total charges for shipment and treatment amounted to \$32.

There is a repeated rumor to the effect that there is a deal on for the entire southwest company at the Canyon. The price is said to be \$600,000.

Dr. J. K. W. Bracken, of Las Vegas, in company with an expert, has left for Montana, after making a careful examination of the different mines. As Dr. Bracken is agent for the Clark interests at Las Vegas, and the further fact of his trip to Montana, point to Senator W. A. Clark as the possible purchaser. —Searchlight.

The Caliente Express has again suspended publication, this time permanently.

It is stated that the field at Caliente will be occupied by the Lode, formerly published at De Lamar.

It is apparent that political influences are at work, and that the transferring of the Lode to Caliente is a strategic move in view of the approaching campaign.

Initial Wholesale Liquor House of Las Vegas

He now has a carload of whiskey en route from the Old Early Times Distillery, of Nelson county, Ky., and is prepared to quote prices on different grades and ages of whiskeys in lots of one or ten barrels.

SACKING ORE

From Surface Ledge on Quo Vadis

Ore is being sacked from a surface ledge at the Quo Vadis, states Mr. J. E. Phillips, who came in from the mine Monday and proceeded to Denver.

Mr. Phillips states that the ledge of high grade ore, which is some distance from the working shaft, now measures 40 feet with 18 inches of high grade ore.

It is stated that a \$2,000,000 company has been formed in Denver to operate the mine. A half-dozen men are now at work, which is all that can be used to advantage at the present time.

MORE SALES PENDING

N. A. Kuhn, dealer in mines and prospects, who successfully negotiated the Quo Vadis sale, states that he has some other important deals pending, which are only awaiting the arrangement of satisfactory terms, and which he believes will be brought to a successful issue in the near future.

It is an interesting fact, says Mr. Kuhn, that all who came in to look at the Quo Vadis property have invested in this section. J. E. Phillips bought the Quo Vadis, Gregg, Burns and associates purchased at Lyons, and B. X. Dawson has just acquired property near Ivanpah, between Nipton and Cima, on the Salt Lake road.

WILL RETIRE

Congressman Van Duzer informs the Beatty Bullfrog Miner that he will retire from politics because he cannot afford to remain in Congress. He will engage in mining in Goldfield and Bullfrog districts. Attorney Bartlett, of Tonopah, will be a candidate before the Democratic convention to succeed Van Duzer.

LABOR TROUBLES

Because of threatened labor troubles Governor Sparks and Attorney General Sweeney visited Goldfield Monday and conferred with the representatives of the labor unions, advising them against violence. Some members of the I. W. W. had threatened the Western Union company, which demanded protection from the State.

N. A. Kuhn and A. D. Catlin this week purchased from Joseph S. Evans a one-half interest in the Idyllwild and Payett claims, which adjoins the Quo Vadis property.

The Johnnie Con. is down 700 feet with plenty of ore in sight.

Other properties will be developed now that the railroad affords better facilities. It is expected that no great activity will be experienced until fall, but Johnnie will be a bustling camp this winter.

The town has been promised a newspaper inside of forty days.
