ABSCONDED

His disappearance and defection will surprise and shock many who have considered him an intimate friend.

J. O. McIntosh, who, so far as known, is the only licent, is out of town and no action has yet been taken.

It is believed that Beatty took the limited Tuesday night for Salt Lake City.

KILLED BY MORPHINE

A man registered as Frank Cook, who has been staying at the Nevada Hotel for a few days, was discovered to be in a prostration condition in his room Thursday afternoon. Dr. Rucker was summoned, but the fellow was too far gone and died an hour or so later.

A 90-grain morphine bottle, two-thirds empty, was found in the room, indicating either a case of suicide or just judgment.

Cook had been about town several days and was drinking some. He is said to have had considerable money, but none was found on his person after death.
