### ABSCONDED

W. N. Beatty, who has recently been employed in J. O. McIntosh's wholesale liquor house, has disappeared.

There is a shortage in his accounts with the liquor house, the extent of which has not yet been ascertained.

Mr. Beatty came to Las Vegas in the early days of the new town, was engaged in business for a time, and has always borne a good reputation.

His disappearance and defalcation will surprise and shock many who have considered him an intimate friend.

J. O. McIntosh, who, so far as known, is the only loser, is out of town and no action has yet been taken.

It is believed that Beatty took the United Tuesday night for Salt Lake City.

### KILLED BY MORPHINE

A man registered as Frank Cook, who has been staying at the Nevada Hotel for a few days, was discovered to be in a precarious condition in his room Thursday afternoon. Dr. Rucker was summoned, but the fellow was too far gone and died an hour or so later.

A 60-grain morphine bottle, two-thirds empty, was found in the room, indicating either a case of suicide or poor judgment.

Cook had been about town several days and was drinking some. He is said to have had considerable money, but none was found on his person after death.

The magazine will be built on government land at Bracken, 4 miles south of Las Vegas, where it will not be subject to the public nuisance regulations.

It is the intention of this firm to make Las Vegas a distributing point in their line and they are sparing no effort to this end.

Heretofore miners have been compelled to buy powder in small quantities or ship it from outside points.
