BLOODY RIOT

Deputy Sheriff Monahan Killed at Caliente

Deputy Sheriff J. J. Monahan was killed at Caliente Tuesday night by a rioting Japanese railroad gang.

The trouble occurred about 10 o'clock. The Japs were riding in freight cars, when the train broke in two, shaking them up. This incensed the foreigners, and they swarmed from the cars, attacking the train men and driving them from their posts. Deputy Sheriff Monahan was summoned and upon attempting to restore order was shot and cut by the rioters. He was removed from the scene and died 20 minutes later.

A vigilance committee was formed and the mob subdued. During the night three of the principal offenders escaped, but were overtaken next morning by an engine with a posse and taken into custody.

Sheriff Johnson was out of the county, and Deputy Sheriff Murphy and District Attorney Horsey, who was in Las Vegas, left for Caliente Wednesday morning to assist in restoring order.

Railroad men are worked-up over the outrage and it would not take much to precipitate further trouble.

LUMBER CAMP

Building Mill in Charleston Mountains

Foundations are in and machinery is ordered for the Schwab lumber mill in Charleston mountains, 22 miles from Corn Creek.

E. D. LeClaire is superintendent and has four men employed at present. A telegram was received by Mr. LeClaire this week stating that the mill machinery had been completed and would be shipped from San Francisco immediately.

The name of the company has recently been changed from Desert Lumber Co. to Lincoln County Lumber Co.

When the machinery arrives a large force of men will be put to work.

Las Vegas is the supply point for the lumber camp. Owens, a new station on the L. V. & T., one mile above Corn Creek, will be the shipping point.

A twelve-mile wagon road was recently built from the railroad to the timber.

TO OPEN MINE

Gold Prospect Will Be Developed

The South Nevada Gold Mining Co. has decided to develop its gold properties eight miles east of Las Vegas.

Paul Ligda, representing the above company and the Pacific Coast Gypsum Co., arrived in Las Vegas this week and is preparing to commence work at once. Mr. Ligda succeeds P. Watelet, who had charge of operations here when the gypsum deposits were opened.

A carload of machinery will arrive from Salt Lake next week. Work will commence at once on a 150-foot drift to test the ledge. About eight men will be employed.

Work on the gypsum deposits has been suspended pending development of the gold prospects. The properties are adjacent and can be worked to better advantage should both prove to be paying propositions.

CHURCH BUILDING

Methodists Will Erect House of Worship

Rev. J. W. Bain states that deeds have been made transferring lots 14, 15 and 16, block 29, to the Methodist Episcopal Church of Las Vegas.

Plans have been selected and the work of erecting a creditable church edifice will begin without further delay.

The property selected is centrally located, on the corner of Third and Bridger streets, facing the public square, and is an admirable site for a church building.

County Assessor Roeder has completed the assessment of property in Las Vegas for 1906.

ENFORCING LAW

Saloons Must Sever From Houses of Shame

Following the order of the recent grand jury, District Attorney Chas. Lee Horsey has been in Las Vegas serving notice on certain saloons that they must obey the State law in regard to maintaining houses of prostitution in connection with their business.

Saloons facing a main business street are forbidden to conduct or condone such places in connection, and saloons maintaining or running in connection with places of prostitution or employing women to solicit trade on commission or otherwise, must pay a license of \$500 in addition to the regular saloon license.

The enforcement of these provisions will probably result in closing most of the houses, as the commissions on the sale of drinks forms no small portion of the income of the unfortunate women.

District Attorney Horsey left Wednesday for Caliente to investigate the riot at that place. He expects to return in a few days.

SEARCHLIGHT RAILROAD



During the week one hundred more head of stock were placed on the Barnwell and Searchlight railroad grade. There were also received several cars of material for the building of bridges and culverts and a full car of powder. It is reported that another big outfit will soon be put to work. The latest advice is to the effect that the laying of rails will start by the first of August.

Articles of incorporation have been filed with the clerk of Lincoln county which designate the name of the corporation as the Barnwell and Searchlight Ry. The capitalization is for \$500,000, divided into 50,000 shares of the par value of \$100 each. \$28,000 has been actually subscribed and paid in, of which amount General Manager Wells of the Santa Fe subscribed \$27,000.—The Searchlight.

SCHWAB CANDIDATE

ANOTHER SMELTER

Steel Magnate Wants to Succeed Senator Newlands

Press dispatches state that Charles M. Schwab, the steel magnate, will take up his residence in Nevada and be a candidate to succeed Senator Newlands when the latter's term expires.

One of Mr. Schwab's friends said recently:

"We believe Mr. Schwab should succeed Mr. Newlands. His investments in Nevada have attracted others and helped the State. It is believed that in the Senate Mr. Schwab could get appropriations for irrigation and other improvements, and that he would promote mining and railroad building.

"Mr. Schwab, after many objections, has consented to allow his name to be used, and in a few months will become a resident of Nevada."

New York Paper Builds One at Caliente

New York Evening Mail says: No more welcome news has recently come to those interested in Southern Nevada mining properties than that which the Mail is now able to give of the intention of the American Smelting and Refining company to erect a great smelting plant in that section.

At the New York office of Senator W. A. Clark and his San Pedro, Los Angeles and Salt Lake railroad, it is learned that this smelter is to be built at Caliente, Nev., about one hundred miles northwest of Las Vegas, the point from which the Clark branch has been built to Bullfrog.
