**ARIZONA CLUB SOLD**

**Claim Jumping**

The ground upon which ex-Senator Stewart took up the fight for an alleged claim jumper at Rhyolite, Nye county, was that the original locator had failed to find mineral in place. As the venerable ex-Senator was one of the framers of the United States mining statutes, which specifically provide that mineralized rock in place must be found before a notice of location is valid, he evidently has the best of the controversy and was justified in inviting the mob that called upon him to get to a warmer place than that arid region.—Virginia Chronicle.

**Mine Held**

The Superior Court has sustained the decision of Judge Nicol, of Tuolumne county, California, in a case of special interest to mine owners. The Carlotta mine, in Tuolumne county, was leased to an association, which failed to pay its employees when work was stopped. The men who held claims for wages brought suit and filed a lien on the property. The Carlotta company objected, but the Superior Judge gave a decision in favor of the miners, holding that the property was liable. The Appellate Court reversed the decision, but the Supreme Court sustains the lower court. It is therefore of importance to owners who lease that they give full notice of non-liability for the debts of lessees or others who may work the mines under special arrangements.

**MAIL SHOULD GO SLOW**

**Kimball Bros. Fined For Giving Better Service**  
 Kimball Bros., who have the contract for carrying the mail between Las Vegas and Beatty, have twice been fined by the Postoffice Department for arriving at Beatty ahead of schedule time.  
 By carrying it part way on the new railroad Kimballs have been enabled to deliver the mail 24 hours earlier than formerly.  
 The matter has been taken up with the department and it is likely that no more fines will be imposed, and the service will continue.  
 The contract between here and Beatty has been extended from July 15th to August 15th.

**MUST BUILD**

The Land and Water Co. is preparing to enforce the building clause, which covers several blocks in the center of town.  
 Those who have erected temporary buildings must now build in accordance with the restrictions or vacate the property.  
 It is understood that an effort is being made to lift the restriction from block 16, so as to permit frame buildings to remain. This will require the acquiescence of those who have already erected buildings in accordance with the deeds.
