**Agricultural Notes and Personal Mention**

Logan, June 18, 1906.

The ladies of Logan have organized a W. C. T. U. Nearly all the ladies have joined.

On the 30th of May the ladies of the W. C. T. U. gave an entertainment, which was quite a success.

Mrs. Giann has been quite ill, but is much better now.

Maggie Thomas is some better, but still confined to her bed.

Jo Huntington is on the mend, but has had a hard tussle with malarial fever. Is out most every day.

Prof. True, of Reno, is here to see how the boys are running the Experiment Station. He intends to buy a team for the station before his return. Since the farm has been fenced and about 40 acres plowed it begins to look quite like a place to experiment with. They have planted squashes, melons, cantaloupes, beans, Kafir corn and sorghum cane and intend to put in millet soon.

The valley is quite well supplied with fruit now. We have ripe apricots, figs, blackberries, peaches and some plums. Cucumbers and string beans are also shipped. The first ripe melon has made its appearance.

Beef cattle are still plentiful. Alfalfa is a good crop so far this year. The second crop is in stacks. Grain has been cut and some of it is in the stacks, and the hum of the threshing machine will soon be heard.

The interest of the farmers seems to be centering on the cantaloupe crop at present. It is estimated there will be one or two carloads per day to ship during the height of the season from the whole valley. If good prices can be secured it means considerable money for the valley.

**A PROTEST**

**Its Application Not Confined to the District Named**

The prospectors who went to the Phillipsburg rush after the strike, held a meeting to protest against the hogging of mineral land. One of the first men in the district located 140 claims—only a matter of 3,000 acres; another got 70, and still another 56. These wholesalers should have a crimp put in them. Claim jumping is considered very disreputable, but it is not half as nasty as this "whole earth" jumping as practiced by these hogs. Think of the gall of a man who will load a wagon with stakes and location notices, hire a couple of men to set the stakes, and then slip out and cover all the country within a mile or two of the original strike. Such work is neither legal nor decent, and such hogs who do it should be treated as they deserve.—Palmetto Herald.

**Tellurium Test**

A noted mining engineer gives this description of telluride and sylvanite, and a simple process for testing the presence of these metals.

"In its natural state tellurium is a whitish metal, with a lustre like silver. It is rarely found in its natural state, however, but more frequently in composition with gold and silver, or both, and in this form it takes the character of sylvanite, or graphic tellurium.

"The prospector who wishes to make the test for sylvanite or tellurium while out in the mountains must take with him a vial of sulphuric acid, with glass stopper, and a small test tube or glass of some sort. He will need nothing more.

"White a few pieces of the native metal, or powder some of the ore believed to be sylvanite, and put it in a dry test tube or glass vessel. Then pour on a small quantity of pure sulphuric acid. Hold the tube over a flame—an alcohol lamp is the best, but the prospector does not always have such a thing available and must make a small fire of live coals and hold the tube close over that. In a moment the acid will begin to boil, and, if the metal is tellurium, or if the powdered ore is sylvanite, the liquid will turn a beautiful wine color, dissolving the metal in its entirety. This is an absolute test for tellurium."

**HOMESTAKE GROUP**
