**Sheriff and District Attorney Make Round Up.**

It is stated, however, that most of the "ladies" refused to stand for the indignity of being compelled to climb the fence for their drinks, and have departed for other pastures, where lumber is higher and crusading officials are not in action.

**TWO JUDGES**

**Las Vegas Township Enjoys Peculiar Distinction**

After the trials this week District Attorney Horsey was asked the following question by The Age:  
"In view of the fact that under your advice H. M. Lillis was appointed Justice of the Peace by the Commissioners, and his bond duly filed and approved, why is it that the cases in which you were prosecuting attorney were taken before Ex-Judge Ralph?"  
Mr. Horsey replied that at the time he advised the appointment of Mr. Lillis the records did not show that Mr. Ralph had ever filed a bond that had been approved, but since his arrival in Las Vegas Mr. Ralph has shown him a certificate acknowledging the approval of such a bond; and that, therefore, no vacancy existed when Mr. Lillis was appointed.  
The fact remains, however, that Mr. Lillis was appointed and his bond approved, and he has received a certificate to that effect.  
The situation is a peculiar one and the new justice has not decided upon his course of action.  
In the meantime Las Vegas is "blessed" with two justices of the peace, and no knowledge of what else may have happened that does not appear on the records.

**STEAMSHIP LINE**

**Senator Clark Discusses Possibility**

Los Angeles Times says: While he brushes the matter of a trans-Pacific steamship line aside lightly, the Senator does not deny that he is considering the matter and admits that it is a possibility. The magnitude of such a move on the part of this giant of finance can hardly be estimated in its importance to Southern California. No great surprise would it be should the Clark and Gould interests unite on a line of transportation from New York to the Orient.  
"Such a line is simply a possibility of the future," said Senator Clark to a Times reporter recently. "While the matter has been thought of and even discussed, I have nothing definite to say on the subject."  
It is a well-known fact that Senator Clark does not take the time to think of, or discuss problems that he does not intend to work out and it only a "possibility of the future," it may be safely said that Senator Clark not only intends to establish transportation connection with the Orient, but is also scheming to gain transcontinental connection with New York.  
Speaking further on this subject, the Senator said: "We have handled some shipments from the Orient, bound for New York. More and more of this business will undoubtedly be turned into San Pedro and we are in the market to handle it overland, but I cannot say that we are going over there after it. That is an air castle."

**FRUIT AND VEGETABLES**

**Big Shipments to Bullfrog Over New Road**

Large quantities of fresh fruit and vegetables are now going into the Bullfrog district over the new L. V. & T. railroad. Keg beer will follow.  
The shipments go by railroad express from Los Angeles via Las Vegas to Rose's Well, leaving only an 18-mile stage haul to the hungry inhabitants of Beatty and Rhyolite.  
At Las Vegas the perishable products are iced while laying over for the Bullfrog flyer.  
Express Agent DeJabs states that a refrigerator car will soon be provided in which to store the produce while laying over here.  
Formerly fruit and similar commodities were taken into the district by way of Tonopah and Goldfield.  
Fresh fruit, vegetables, butter and eggs, and draught beer, on ice all the way, will make life worth living in the thriving mining camps to the north.  
Express charges are high, but will be lower when the Borax road approaches close enough to compete.

**MOAPA MELONS**

**Nevada Cantaloupes Are First in the Market.**  
Nevada cantaloupes made their first appearance on the Salt Lake market last Saturday. The shipment was from Moapa. From now on regular shipments will be made from Moapa. The price of these cantaloupes was \$4 per crate. California cantaloupes arrived in the Salt Lake market this week.  
Cherries are ripe and selling from 6 to 15 cents per pound.

**WATER TANKS**

**South Nevada Gold Mining Co.'s Operations**

W. D. Worrell has just completed a 2000-gallon storage tank and a large wagon tank for the South Nevada Gold Mining Co., which is preparing to develop its property eight miles east of Las Vegas.  
The 2000-gallon tank is to furnish water for the boilers which are now being installed. It is the intention of the company to later on pump water from its wells in the Vegas wash. At present water will be hauled to the mine from Las Vegas.  
The South Nevada Co. has received a quantity of machinery and is making substantial preparations for real development work.  
Dr. G. Hillegas, president of the company, is here personally supervising the preliminary work.

**MORE TANKS**

Mr. Worrell has contracted for a 600-gallon iron tank to be delivered to R. G. Fairbanks at Johnnie Siding. This tank is probably for use at one of the Johnnie mines.

**DEAL IN CLAIMS**

H. Farrell has agreed with Messrs. Lake, Tuck and Burkhart to expend the sum of \$250 in development work with a view of buying a one-half interest in their claims in the Vincent district, at a substantial figure.
