TOPOGRAPHICAL MAP
Las Vegas Included in Survey Now Being Made
B. D. Stewart, U. S. geological surveyor, is in Las Vegas to commence work on a government topographical map of this section.
The map will include Las Vegas township and a large section of country to the north and west as far as Ash Meadows. It will also take in a portion of the Furnace Creek district of Death Valley.
Mr. Stewart estimates that it will take six months to complete the map. Maps of the country further north were made last year.
Searchlight, Crescent, and El Dorado Canyon districts should be included to make a complete mapping of this end of the state.

POLITICAL LEAGUE

Citizens Organize to Protect Community

About 25 citizens of Las Vegas met at Eagle's hall last Friday night and organized the Las Vegas Branch of the Consolidated Political League of Lincoln county.
J. O. McIntosh acted as temporary chairman and outlined the purposes of the meeting and proposed organization in an earnest and eloquent manner. Briefly stated they are as follows: To promote political reform in Las Vegas and Lincoln county, to endeavor to elect only honest and competent men to office, regardless of their partisanship, and to work and vote for the defeat of all members of the ring or clique which now controls important local and county offices.
At the conclusion of the explanatory address, F. W. Manuel was elected permanent chairman and I. W. Botkin secretary. A committee of nine was appointed to draft resolutions for the guidance of the league.
General discussion of plans resulted in an agreement to the effect that all members of the League may participate in their respective party primaries and conventions. After the nominations have been made the organization will select the candidate to whom it will throw its support.
While no names were mentioned, sentiments expressed indicated clearly that the league will have a keen-bladed axe ready for the present township officials and all who have upheld them in their practices. The gathering seemed to be very much in earnest and some forcible sentiments were expressed.
The committee met at Dr. C. A. Rucker's office Sunday evening and drafted resolutions. Following are the members: James Brown, Ed Von Tobel, W. E. Hawkins, H. M. Lillis, Dr. C. A. Rucker, John Hopkins, H. H. Farrell, L. Holcomb, J. J. Sullivan.
On Tuesday evening of this week the League met and adopted the report of the committee as follows:
"Your committee appointed to prepare a declaration of principles respectfully submit the following for your consideration, that is to say:
"Section 1—This organization shall be known and designated as the Las Vegas Branch of the Consolidated Political League of Lincoln County, Nevada.
"Section 2—All male citizens of Las Vegas precinct of the age of majority or upwards are entitled to become members of this league.
"Section 3—The purpose for which this league is formed is to purify as far as possible the politics of Lincoln county, Nevada, and to endeavor to elect honest, upright and impartial men to be officials of said county.
"Section 4—The members of this organization hereby pledge themselves to attend the primaries of their respective political parties and strive for the election of delegates to the various county conventions men who will nominate honest, upright and impartial men for the legislative and county tickets of Lincoln County.
"Section 5—The officers of this organization shall be a president, a vice-president and secretary and such other officers and committees as the league may designate."
John W. Hopkins was elected vice-president of the League.
Report was made that a similar organization had been perfected at Caliente.
J. O. McIntosh was made official organizer, and will visit Searchlight and other points.
After some discussion and the transaction of routine business the meeting adjourned to Friday evening July 27th. Blissful harmony prevailed. At the meetings, the members designate each other as "brother" and listen patiently to the most painful "speeches."
The League has undertaken an important work and if partisanship does not rear its ugly head, perhaps something may be accomplished.
