#### Land Owners Dont Want Taxes Raised

Los Angeles, Cal., July 16, 1906.

LAS VEGAS AGE-DEAR EDITOR: Permit me, one of your subscribers and a land owner, a few lines of your valuable space, on this subject of taxation and improvement. First, I want to say right here, I am heartily in favor of anything, or any reasonable scheme or business proposition that will raise this wonderful valley to eminence. I am not in favor of attempting to do so by threats of taxation, which would mean confiscation to many a poor man like myself, who has had a hard struggle to hold his land until such time as he may see his way clear to build a home and make improvements in accordance with his own business judgment and accumen.

Los Angeles county made no such mistake. The lands were held here just so long as they paid the owners as farms, no longer. Just as soon as the demand came to cut up into smaller ranches and for building lots, it was done, not before.

They were taxed as values grew, naturally, justly, in accordance with the improvements in a legal, business way, and if people continue to come here for the next five years as they have for the past ten, taxes will increase in the same ratio, and there will not be a vacant acre or building lot from the mountains to the sea, and what does this mean? For some time the small ranchers, vegetable men, etc., have been hunting lands, cheap lands, good lands, where water may be had cheaply and in abundance.

Today we are importing fodder from Bakersfield and further. What are the dairymen, etc., to do? Where is the next great valley only a little over 300 miles away-Las Vegas-but there is something to be done. If the people of Las Vegas will show that they have confidence in their own by sinking an experimental well, and are successful in bringing a flowing well to the surface, and exemplifying to the world that alfalfa for instance, will grow, and does grow, then your county or your end of it will grow as did Los Angeles.

I am told Mr. Editor, that the necessary money and lands were subscribed for this purpose. I was called would like to respectfully ask, what has become of this money! Why is this well not sunk?

Perhaps I have not the right to ask. It may be impertinent, not having myself donated-but Las Vegas can't afford, nor can her people, nor the outside land owners, to have anything approaching "graft" be said of this coun- C. P. 


