INTERESTING QUESTIONS

Non-Resident Writes About Taxes and Water

LOS ANGELES, CAL., July 28, 1906.
EDITOR LAS VEGAS AGE:
Referring to the enclosed article headed "Raise Taxes," also the following correspondence and your comment on same, I wish to say a word—I am a non-resident owner of a possessory claim to lands in your county. That is I hold contracts with the state. Your records will show that non-resident owners hold but little land under patent. Now suppose these people refuse to pay tax to your county, what can it do? You say sell them out. What would the county sell? It cannot forfeit the state contract which does not provide for the payment of county taxes so long as the purchaser under contract pays interest to the state; it cannot forfeit the contract and land to the state. What would the purchaser at a tax sale get? Suppose the buyer at the time of forfeiture, has a party to apply for the land in another name, the state is bound under the law to let him have it. Suppose afterwards the new purchaser transfers his claim to the old buyer, would he not escape taxes and yet get the land? It seems to me the less said about taxes the better as the county has no legal claim against contract purchasers, and no way to enforce collection from non-residents. Permit me to give you credit for starting an entirely new way to attract settlers and build up a county. Heretofore low taxation has been a special inducement to attract people and money. I have been paying an illegal tax in your county for ten years and have had no personal benefit to my property or self. Now as to water development, non-residents have paid money to your home water company, I paid money myself and got two others to pay and upon my endorsement of the plan and the officials of the company. I am informed that the company collected enough to sink two artesian wells. No wells have been sunk and no money returned. Do you expect us to lose that and put down wells of our own? I put my money into the company to assist in developing the resources of the county. I refer you to Mr. Peter Budd, land commissioner of your county or state.
