## MINING ITEMS

### Brief Notes of Hot Weather Development

Three men are at work on the Bishop, Colson and Jefferson claims 23 miles southeast of Las Vegas. The shaft is down 75 feet and deepening at the rate of 2 1/2 feet per day. They have plenty of water in their cement cistern and comfortable working quarters. A ton of ore will be sent to Salt Lake for a mill run.

French & Son have taken in supplies from Searchlight and will soon commence work on their claim adjoining the above property.

C. T. Pine, James Peacock and Jim Robinson are in the oil field country 20 miles southeast of Indian Creek, to look after their holdings and do some development work. Well boring machines will be sent in soon when they will

work with the Nevada Home Oil Co. in sinking a test well.

Keith & Hamilton expect to soon commence development of their group of claims in the Vincent district. Martin Hamilton has arrived from San Francisco to assist in getting things started. The claims are among the most promising in the new district.

At the South Nevada Gold Mining Co.'s property, eight miles east of Las Vegas, Manager Ligda has a force at work installing a car and a half of machinery which recently arrived. It is understood that a large force of miners will shortly be employed.

## COMMISSIONERS

### Official Minutes of County Board

The board of County Commissioners met on August 6th, 1906, present, R. J. Gordon, chairman, Jas. A. Nesbett, member, C. L. Horsey, district attorney and Eugene Goodrich, clerk.

The minutes of the meeting of July 2, 1906, were read and approved.

An order was made transferring the sum of 26c from the general county fund to the state fund.

The monthly reports of all county officers were read and approved.

The claims against the county, both salary and general were passed on and allowed as per register of claims.

A fee bill of Wm. Maynard was cut from \$7.50 to \$5.00, another bill was cut from \$86.75 to \$69.00.

Upon a communication from the citizens of Alamo the name of Stewart school district was changed to Alamo, as the post office is Alamo, an order was made to change Stewart school district to Alamo District No. 25.

A petition was read from Caliente asking for the appointment of J. M. Taylor as constable of Caliente township. Appointed and a bond of \$1,000 was approved.

A resignation of Milt Damron as constable of Fay was read and received.

A petition was received from Crescent asking that a voting precinct be established at Crescent, Lincoln county, and it is hereby ordered that a voting precinct be established and that same be known as Crescent voting precinct. The boundaries of said district shall be as outlined in said petition, which are as follows: Starting at a central point at Crescent, running 4 miles easterly, 3 1/2 miles westerly or thereabouts to California line, 4 miles southerly and 4 miles northerly from said center.

Geo. W. Mrgan was appointed registry agent.

Upon application of Elmer Middleton an engineers license was ordered issued to said Elmer Middleton.

A lease in duplicate for Caliente jail site was presented and signed by the chairman.

An order is hereby made that a school district be created to be known as Crescent school district No. 30.

A bill of Eugene Goodrich for \$150 was laid over until next meeting.

C. W. Garrison appeared before the board and offered the sum of \$30 for lots 4, 15, 16, 17 and 18 in block 3, and lot 21, block 25. The same was ordered transferred for the sum of \$30.

A communication from Panaca district stated that David Findlay registry agent was sick with small pox and therefore resigned as such registry agent. A. O. Lee was appointed to act as such registry agent for Panaca district.

F. R. McNamie appeared before the board on behalf of H. M. Lias, who was heretofore by order of the board appointed as justice of the peace of Las Vegas township, requesting the board to make an order directing the district attorney to bring proceedings in the nature of quo warranto to test his right to the office of justice of the peace of said township.

Meeting then adjourned until first Monday of September, 1906.

## JOHNNIE

The Johnnie Con. Gold Mining Co. has moved its headquarters from Los Angeles to Johnnie. Work on the Johnnie Mine has been resumed in earnest.

Frank E. Bennett of Los Angeles has purchased a third interest in the Kate and Maud S. claims, buying out Edward Priest of Searchlight. The other owners of the claims are Harry Simmons of Johnnie and Sam Jolly of Colorado Springs.

### GOLDFIELD

Maryelous Production of Nevada's Infant Camp

When the difficulties under which the mining district of Goldfield has labored during its history are taken into consideration, the output from the district for the past year and a half is extraordinary. During the short life of the camp it has produced about \$9,000,000 in gold, a record which few if any districts in the country have ever equaled. At the same time this amount does not represent the actual results of the work done in this period.

From Goldfield to the smelters of Salt Lake is about 1,000 miles and the freight rates make it practically impossible to market any but ore that would average \$100 a ton. Enormous quantities of lower grade ore have accumulated on the dumps.
