BLACK SAND

Prospectors should investigate all deposits of black sand. The U. S. Geological department has found that this sand usually carries platinum, which is more precious than gold. Other valuable minerals, useful in the arts, are found in black sand, which is plentiful in the western states, especially along the big streams.

Platinum is worth \$20 an ounce. It will remain in the pan with gold and can be distinguished by its bright silvery color. The grains are usually smaller than gold grains.
