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RAIN AND WASHOUTS

Salt Lake and the Tonopah Branch Suffer

One of the heaviest rainstorms for several seasons visited this section during last Friday, Saturday and Sunday. The heaviest downpour was during Saturday night and Sunday, when probably upward of an inch of rain fell.

The Salt Lake track to the north between Cana and Kyle was badly washed and traffic between Las Vegas and Caliente was suspended from Monday morning till Thursday. Overland passengers were returned to Los Angeles and transferred to the northern routes, as both the Southern Pacific and Santa Fe were badly crippled in Arizona, where heavy rain was also experienced.

The grade of the L. V. & T. between Las Vegas and Rose Well was badly washed at several points. Temporary

repairs were promptly made and trains are running as usual.

Residents of the old town report that during Saturday night the water rushed through the streets in torrents. This was a part of the flood from the west that washed the L. V. & T. tracks.

Cool days and nights have prevailed since the storm, and it is likely that no more excessively hot weather will be experienced this year. The thermometer has not registered higher than 90 this week.

DEMOCRATS

Citizens Invite Convention to Las Vegas

The Republican county convention will be held at Las Vegas, September 19th. Our citizens are also willing and anxious to entertain the Democratic hosts and will try to persuade them to hold their convention here.

It has been suggested that both conventions be held here the same day, and an effort will be made to this end.

Funds have been raised for entertainment purposes, half-fare rates have been secured from the railroad, and all that remains is to secure favorable action by the Democratic county central committee.

The local Democratic club should take the matter up with the committeemen at once, for the mutual benefit of the town and their organization.

There are many good reasons why the convention should be held at Las Vegas. It is centrally located, being more accessible from all parts of the county than any other town. More delegates and visitors will attend than if held in one end of the county. Next to Searchlight, it is the largest town in the county and can provide ample accommodations for the visitors. Low railroad rates and entertainment are offered as special inducements. Here is an opportunity for citizens from all sections to get together and get acquainted.

Our citizens hope the Democratic county central committee will accept the invitation in the spirit in which it is extended.

GREENWATER

New Ore Body Struck in the Clark Shaft

At a depth of 230 feet in the Furnace Creek Copper Company's shaft a new ore body has been encountered. The new strike cuts across the shaft and is high grade ore.

J. P. Harvey, who has just returned from a vacation trip along the Pacific coast, is elated over the good news and started for the camp without delay. He stated that he hardly knew what to think of it, and predicts that the District will prove to be another Bisbee.

Mr. Harvey, representing the Patsy Clark interests, was the pioneer of the now famous district and naturally feels a pardonable pride in the accuracy of his judgment.

When the Furnace Creek Copper Co. started development it was necessary to travel and freight supplies by team from Las Vegas. Now the railroad is within 45 miles and it is still considered a difficult trip owing to scarcity of water.

The strike of the Furnace Creek Co. proves that the country has depth and will serve to stimulate enthusiasm over the Greenwater district.

REPUBLICANS

Convention, Primaries, State Delegates

The Republican county convention will be held in Las Vegas, on Thursday September 19th. Probably between 75 and 100 delegates, candidates and visitors will be in attendance from outside points. The railroad company has made a rate of one fare for the round trip from all parts of the county, and Las Vegas will properly entertain the visitors during their stay.

CENTRAL COMMITTEE

At a meeting of the county central committee at Caliente last Saturday, Walter R. Bracken, W. J. Stewart and F. W. Mannel were present from Las Vegas. Chairman F. R. McNamee presided and Walter R. Bracken was elected secretary.

The committee designated the time and place for holding the county convention, the date, places, and judges for the various primary elections, and appointed delegates to the State convention to be held at Tonopah, September 4th.

After passing some resolutions and transacting minor business matters the committee adjourned to the call of the chair.

PRIMARIES

The date set for holding the Republican primaries for the election of delegates to the county convention is Tuesday, September 11th. The polls will be open between the hours of 8 a. m. and 11 a. m., and from 2 o'clock p. m. to 8 o'clock p. m.

The polling place for Las Vegas precinct is the office of Las Vegas Mercantile Co. on First street. The judges of election are A. W. Jurdien, C. C. Ronnow and H. M. Lillis.
