WHY?

It is a self evident fact that the reading public has brought itself to believe that a newspaper should be subservient to some particular political party.

Why? Because most newspaper publishers take advantage of their position to promote the interests of the party to which they adhere—for selfish and other reasons.

Why should a newspaper be expected to thrust the personal politics of its proprietor upon a community any more than a hardware merchant or a grocery man? A newspaper is a business proposition. Its business is to publish the news and promote the interests of the community in which it is published. Its business interests are identical with those of the butcher, the baker and the candlestick maker.

It has been said that a man cannot serve two masters. No more can a newspaper. It cannot serve a political party and the public at the same time—unless the party happens to be immaculate, which is seldom the case.

If newspaper partisanship is right, it will be next in order for each business house to procure a talking machine which will announce to its patrons and the passer-by that the proprietor is a Republican or a Democrat, and will conduct his business in the interests of his party and its nominees.

To a newspaper publisher, the same as to every other citizen, the community welfare should be of more importance than party politics. Too much party and too little public spirit is the tendency of the times.

In the coming campaign The Age will cast what influence it has on the side of public welfare. It will bear in mind that this section of the county has no representation at the county seat and has been thus far practically ignored.

It will endeavor to support honest candidates whose interests are not antagonistic to Las Vegas and southern Lincoln county.

It will not be Republican one week and Democratic the next. It will not have two editors with conflicting and uncertain policies. It will not play Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde.

B. E. Stewart, and his assistants of the U. S. Geological Survey, are now working east from Indian Creek in what is probably the driest section of Nevada.

Mr. Stewart states that there is an area of 2,000 square miles in which not a drop of water is to be found. One spring in this vast area furnishes an occasional supply of water but it is dry most of the year.

From the eastern boundary of the territory to be included in the present survey, the party will work southward through Las Vegas, making the first complete and authentic survey of this section for the compiling of a geological map.
