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THE CONVENTION

Republicans Present Ticket—North Gets Most of the Offices—County Division and Railroad Rates Ignored—Las Vegas Loses Sheriff Fight

Lincoln County Republican convention was called to order at 10:30 Wednesday morning by F. R. McNamee, chairman of the county central committee. About 49 delegates were present.

F. R. McNamee was elected temporary chairman and Eugene Goodrich secretary.

Chairman McNamee, in a brief address, threw his hat at the representative gathering, contrasting it with the convention of two years ago, and made a passionate plea for customary Republican harmony. Upon motion, he then named the following committees:

Credentials—Ed. Von Tobel, Las Vegas; E. P. Gordon, Pioche; Harry Underhill, Caliente; L. C. Calloway, Panaca; Frank Doherty, Searchlight; B. Bonelli and A. M. Thompson, Bunkerville.

Permanent Organization and Order of Business—H. W. Turner, De Lamar; A. W. Jurden, Las Vegas; W. P. Murray, Caliente; Eli Edwards, Panaca; J. W. Brown, Pioche.

Platform and Resolutions—H. M. Lillis, Las Vegas; H. H. Church, Logan; R. H. McElwain, Searchlight; Eugene Goodrich, Pioche; Harry Lawry, Panaca; W. T. Roberts, Good Springs; Jesse Peaslee, Pioche; H. S. Laney, Caliente. Upon motion F. R. McNamee was made member of this committee.

The convention then adjourned till two o'clock. Upon reconvening the reports of the various committees were heard and adopted without discussion, as follows:

ORGANIZATION

The committee on permanent organization and order of business reported as follows:

That H. M. Lillis, of Las Vegas, be made permanent chairman of the convention.

That Eugene Goodrich, of Pioche, be made permanent secretary of this convention.

That the chairman then appoint the sergeant-at-arms.

That an assessment be levied on each nominee, except for the office of Public Administrator, said assessment to be used for defraying current expenses of this convention, in amounts as follows: For Commissioners, \$2.50; all other offices, Public Administrator excepted, each \$5.

N. A. Kuhn presided as toastmaster in his usual happy way. Among those who responded were W. R. Thomas, Las Vegas; F. R. McNamee, De Lamar; W. P. Murray, Caliente.

To the committee on barbecue and refreshments, as well as to Messrs. Garwood and Miller, belongs great credit for the success of this most difficult feature of the program. All who were present had only words of praise for the splendid menu and excellent service.

The dance later in the evening brought out one of the largest crowds that has ever gathered for a similar event in Las Vegas. The Arizona Club orchestra rendered excellent music for the dances, interspersed with vocal selections, which were much appreciated.

It was well after midnight when the happy throng dispersed.

All features of the day's entertainment were successfully carried out and much enjoyed by the visitors.

Most of the delegates returned to their homes Thursday morning, feeling better for their visit to the "Gem City of the Desert."

El Dorado

El Dorado mines will become more active when the Santa Fe railroad reaches Searchlight, as the haul to rail will then be only 21 miles. The Wall Street, Techatcup, Black Hawk and Venus will be among the producers.

Few men are at present employed around El Dorado district, but the camp will take new life with cool weather and better railroad facilities.

El Dorado has only 18 registered voters and elected no delegates to the Republican convention—perhaps they are all Democrats.
