Democrats Name a Strong Ticket With Harmony and Enthusiasm W. E. Hawkins, of Las Vegas, for Commissioner.

The convention was called to order at 10:30 o'clock by Chairman Denton of the County Central Committee. Senator Denton made a brief, but forceful, address on Democracy and the duties and opportunities confronting the convention, arousing great enthusiasm.

Levi Syphus, of Panaca, was elected temporary chairman and Wm. E. Orr, of Pioche, temporary secretary. The chair appointed committees on credentials, organization and platform and the convention adjourned until two o'clock p. m. Committees were made up as follows:

**CREDENTIALS**—A. J. Roeder, H. Olson, A. O. Lee, E. T. Maxwell, H. H. Sparks.

**Permanent Organization and Order of Business**—J. A. Clark, J. H. Vaughn, Chas. C. Corkhill, H. P. Henniger, E. E. Smith.

**Resolutions and Platform**—Frank Williams, F. L. Reber, J. A. Denton, J. A. Nibitt, Geo. Baldwin.

Upon reconvening the credentials committee reported favorably on all delegates and proxies present.

**ORGANIZATION**  
 The committee on order of business reported as follows:

We recommend C. C. Corkhill as permanent chairman and Wm. E. Orr as permanent secretary of this convention.

That the chairman appoint one sergeant-at-arms to be allowed the sum of \$5; that the secretary be allowed the sum of \$10.

That each candidate nominated shall pay the sum of \$5, except public administrator, from which no fee shall be collected, and commissioners, who shall pay the sum of \$2.50.

That the order of nominations shall be as follows: Assemblymen (three), Recorder and Auditor, Treasurer, Clerk, Public Administrator, District Attorney, Sheriff, Assessor, Commissioner (long term), Commissioner (short term); township officers to be nominated by each delegation.

The report being adopted, Chas. C. Corkhill assumed the chair. Josh Oliphant was appointed sergeant-at-arms.

Following the report of the committee on platform (published below), nomination of candidates proceeded in the order named, all nominations being made by acclamation and with much enthusiasm. Each candidate addressed the convention, pledging loyalty to the ticket and faithfulness to their constituents if elected. Ed. W. Clark, for Treasurer, and Phil. Smith, for Sheriff, received ovations as they took the floor. All received loud applause.

It was ordered that an executive committee of seven be elected by the convention, with a chairman and secretary, to be selected by the nominees, to be thereafter added. The following were elected to the committee: C. A. Rucker, Las Vegas; E. E. Smith; J. A. Clark, Pioche; J. A. Denton, Caliente; C. W. Thomas; A. O. Lee, Panaca; J. I. Eari, Bunkerville. It was ordered that each precinct name five members of a committee to act in conjunction with the executive committee as a county central committee.

Nevada Northern Completed to Copper Camp

On Tuesday evening of last week the last rail was laid which connects the great copper camp of Ely with the outer world.

Railroad day will be celebrated today (Sept. 29) and plans have been made to make it one of the most memorable in the history of the State.

The Nevada Northern road has opened up a long stretch of mineralized ground which has been drawing and will draw in the future upon the city of Salt Lake for all sorts of commodities and supplies, as Lincoln county and the Humboldt district draw upon the Los Angeles markets.

### CONVENTION TIPS

#### DEMOCRATIC

Northern candidates were organized and had the whip hand, but treated the south with consideration.

W. E. Hawkins, for commissioner, will strengthen the Democratic ticket in Las Vegas.

Five incumbents were renominated, Assemblyman Frank Williams, Recorder Henry Lee, Public Administrator James Lemoine, District Attorney Chas. Lee Horsey, and Assessor John F. Roeder.

Denton hall, at Caliente, is a splendid convention and dance hall. It was prettily decorated for the Democratic gathering.

The Democratic county platform is just as useless as the Republican. It dwells at great length upon a dead issue like the Republican convention of last week, but utterly ignores such important matters as county division and railroad rate legislation. Men who have not the courage to state their position on live public questions will not long retain public confidence.

Las Vegas people will readily guess the source of the verbosity of the Democratic platform.

"Honest" John Roeder made the hit of the day when he said to the convention: "As Assessor, I will always do the best I can." In his confusion, he omitted the words, "my duty."

Caliente appears to be pleased with the results of the convention and promises to roll up a majority for most of the Democratic nominees.

Legislative candidates will be asked to state their position on county division and railroad rates. Both party platforms ignore these subjects, but the voters will not.

Candidates for the legislature are either for or against county division or county seat removal. Voters should be careful in selecting their assemblymen.

### Cala-Nevada

Chas. Smithson and associates recently struck free milling gold ore at the Cala-Nevada mine, two miles south of Crescent.

Many good properties are coming to the front in the vicinity of the State line, both in Nevada and California. Cooler weather brings a resumption of work.
