TONOPAH AND TIDEWATER

May Build Branch to Greenwater
 A letter from Superintendent Ryan's office brings the following information regarding the Tonopah and Tidewater railroad:
 "We now have 75 miles of steel laid and are in the heavy work of the Amargosa canyon. We have, at the present time, about 400 head of stock working, and will have at least 800 within the next 30 days, and everything is being done to push the work as rapidly as possible.

"After we have finished with the canyon it will take from 40 to 50 days to reach the Lila C. mine, the nearest point to Greenwater district, and about 60 days more to get into Beatty, as we will employ a large force to do the grading.
 "Steel, bolts, ties, etc., for the entire line are now stored at Laddow, so we will have no further delay in that respect.
 "Our main line will go within 16 miles of the Greenwater district, and if by the time we reach that point we think business would justify it, we will construct a branch line from there into Greenwater."

The Funding Bills

Hon Frank Williams, of Good Springs, who voted for the two funding bills vetoed by Governor Sparks, allows The Age to publish the following extracts from a letter he wrote on the subject some time ago:
 "The unpaid interest far exceeds the principal. While the principal, \$181,000, draws 10 per cent interest, happily, the unpaid interest does not. The entire debt amounts to about \$650,000. Now, if the county commissioners, in accordance with the provisions of this act, were to refund the debt for, say, \$550,000, or \$100,000 less than the present debt, and at 5 per cent interest instead of 10 per cent, it would, in reality, make the debt greater than ever. Five per cent interest on \$550,000 would amount to \$27,500 annually, instead of \$18,100, as it is on the present debt. This extra \$9,400 per year would soon neutralize the reduction of \$100,000, and, continuing, would make the debt much greater before it could be paid. The opponents of this bill believed that the commissioners were capable of doing such dastardly act. I did not think it possible that they would make such a deal, nor do I believe it was contemplated on either side. Yet, in theory, one can readily see that such a thing was possible. So, on that basis, suspecting the commissioners of the worst action possible, the opposition was justified.
 "For this reason I like the second bill much better than the first. It removes this possibility, however remote it may have been. It is simply an enabling act, authorizing the commissioners to refund the bonded indebtedness of 1873, providing it could be done for a sum not exceeding \$400,000, and at a rate of interest not exceeding 5 per cent. If, as Mr. Turner intimates, it could be done for less, they would be in a position to do so."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
 One Constitutional Amendment—No. XII.

BALLOTS

All election tickets or ballots to be used at the said ensuing General Election, in Lincoln County, Nevada, shall be such as are prescribed by the election law and furnished by the secretary of state. Each ballot or ticket shall be free from all marks, characters, or device of things that would enable any person to distinguish it by the back, or of which folded, from any other ticket or ballot, and no mark shall be made on such ballots except thus X with a ruler stamp only in the square opposite the name of the candidate you vote for. The name of no candidate shall be erased or crossed out, and the ballot must not be marked in any other way except by said cross X in said square, otherwise the ballot will not be counted.

SAMPLE BALLOTS

One sample ballot will be provided for by the Board of Election, for each registered voter, as appears in section 25, page 57, Australian Ballot Law. Upon application, each registered voter will be given one sample ballot.

Who Pays the Taxes?

Judge Beal has been gathering information from the county records and finds that the railroads pay about two-fifths and the people the other three-fifths of the revenues collected in Lincoln county, as follows:
 Total taxes paid in 1905 by S. P., L. A. & S. L. R. R. Co. \$ 40,584.47
 Total paid by other taxpayers of Lincoln county as per rolls of 1905..... 15,622.23
 Total licenses, fees and other taxes paid by people of Lincoln county in 1905..... 49,300.11
 Total..... \$105,506.86
 Thus the figures above prove that the common people of Lincoln county pay three-fifths of the county taxes.

Record Price for Silver

The director of the Mint Monday purchased 150,000 ounces of silver at 70.13 cents per fine ounce, delivered at the mint in Denver.
