MOAPA NOTES

Valuable Silver Deposit Reported Discovered
(Special Correspondence)

Antonio Apache, of the Los Angeles Curio Gardens, was here this week and took away a small group of Moapa Indians to put into the gardens. The Indians took their wickiups along with them and will live in true Indian style.

J. H. Butner, the passenger and freight agent of the S. P. L. A. & S. L., has been here for several days looking after the affairs of the company, and also his own private interests, which are very extensive in this vicinity.

The railroad company had an engineer here this week viewing out a right-of-way for a railroad down the Muddy river to the vicinity of Cedar Basin.

Considerable excitement has been occasioned here over the discovery of a 25-foot silver ledge within five miles of this place. Everybody is out locating claims. There is a 300-foot belt of highly mineralized ground, containing three distinct ledges, the smallest of which is seven feet wide, and the whole thing can be traced for four or five miles. Mr. Lovelace, the discoverer of this big proposition, has gone to Las Vegas to have assays made of the samples which he brought in.

Bob Montgomery, one of the original owners of the Montgomery-Shoshone group of mines at Beatty, which recently sold for several million dollars, is here with four or five men investigating the new discovery. It looks as though big things would be doing soon.
