BEATTY'S DAY

Many Visitors Participate in Celebration

A dozen coaches laden with enthusiastic excursionists from Salt Lake, Los Angeles and other points pulled out of the Salt Lake depot at Las Vegas about 11:30 Monday morning for Beatty, the present terminal of the new L. V. & T. railroad.

The following committee came down Sunday evening to welcome the excursionists and escort them to the mining center:

The trains from Los Angeles and Salt Lake arrived during the forenoon, and while the Beatty flyer was being made up the visitors put in the time seeing Las Vegas. A Los Angeles band played several selections at the depot, and the fluttering ribbons of the various delegations and townspeople boomed gave a genuine gala appearance to the scene.

The excursionists were given nearly two days in the mining district, returning by way of Las Vegas Wednesday evening—some the worse for wear and certain desert refreshments.

Among the prominent railroad officials who participated in the celebration were J. Ross Clark, C. O. Whittenmore and F. M. Grace.

Several boxes of fine apples grown on Las Vegas ranch were placed on the excursion train by W. E. Hawkins.

Mr. Hawkins also entertained the Beatty reception committee which arrived in Las Vegas Sunday evening to wait for the excursionists.

Justice Court

The following cases were disposed of in Judge Lillis' court during the week: Las Vegas Mercantile Co. vs. Geo. R. Garwood—Suit for payment of checks given plaintiff by defendant. Judgment given plaintiff for \$45 and costs of suit, and execution on attachment is sued against certain property of defendant contained in what is known as the Exchange Lunch Counter.

Geo. R. Garwood vs. Ray M. Tyler—Suit for damages in the sum of \$300 for taking possession of business of Exchange Lunch Counter without due process of law. Judgment rendered in favor of the plaintiff, Garwood, for the sum of \$15 and costs.

Summons was issued in the case of Kuhn Mercantile Co. vs. Wilson-Lyon Co. and others—Suit for the collection of certain bills alleged to be due the plaintiff for supplies.

TOWN GOVERNMENT

Power of Commissioners is Regulated by Law

The Act approved February 26, 1881, provides for the organization under the direction of the Board of County Commissioners for the management of the affairs and business of any town or city in their respective counties.

The amendment passed in 1903, at page 55, provides the following powers for city government, viz:

1. To fix the boundaries.
2. To maintain suits in the name of the town.
3. To levy a tax not exceeding 1 1/2 per cent.
4. To lay out, extend and alter the streets and alleys and provide for grading, draining, cleaning, widening, lighting, and the construction, repair and preservation of sidewalks, bridges, drains, sewers, and for the prevention and removal of obstructions from the streets and sidewalks.
5. To condemn property for the use of the town.
6. To provide fire department and the appointment and payment of officers.
7. To regulate the storage of gunpowder and other explosives.
8. To regulate nuisances and provide for punishment.
9. To fix and collect license taxes upon all kinds of business and dogs, and prohibit hogs, goats, cows and other animals from running at large.
10. Provide licenses.
11. To prevent, punish and restrain disorderly conduct and maintain a board of health.
12. To manage and dispose of the town property and collect all demands and dues.
13. To prescribe the punishment for the breach of any ordinance provided for the regulation of the town.
14. To audit and allow all claims payable out of the funds of the town.
15. Under this organization taxes may be levied and collected as provided in sections 2175 and 2176 of Cutting's Compiled Laws, and subsequent sections provide as to incurring of indebtedness for making needed improvements, etc., and the duties of the officers, the jurisdiction of the justice of the peace, the district attorney and the chief of police, etc.
