9. To fix and collect license taxes upon all kinds of business and dogs, and prohibit hogs, goats, cows and other animals from running at large.

10. Provide licenses. 11. To prevent, punish and restrain

disorderly conduct and maintain a board 12. To manage and dispose of the town property and collect all demands

and dues. 13. To prescribe the punishment for the breach of any ordinance provided

for the regulation of the town. 15. To audit and allow all claims

payable out of the funds of the town. Under this organization taxes may be levied and collected as provided in sections 2175 and 2176 of Cutting's Compiled Laws, and subsequent sections provide as to incurring of indebtedness for making needed improvements, etc., and the duties of the officers, the jurisdiction of the justice of the peace, the district attorney and the chief of police, etc.
