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SEARCHLIGHT

From Las Vegas Age.

(Special Correspondence.)

In some respects Searchlight resembles a farming town. The mines are scattered and many men board and live at the mines and do not rush to the saloons in the evening. House rent and board are cheap at the mines to induce men to stay near their work.

Recorder Frank H. Doherty says about 1500 mining claims have been recorded in Searchlight district.

Searchlight has a good telephone system, reaching out to the mines and to Nipton, Leastalk and Eldorado. About ninety phones are now in use. Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Atwell have charge of the system. There are 250 miles of wire in the district, connecting with telegraph lines.

On arrival of the Santa Fe railroad the Searchlight mines will use oil for fuel to generate steam power. Electric power from Colorado river should be used.

The Quartette mine is a great dividend-payer. The Duplex and Searchlight are more than paying running expenses. Others will become producers with further development.

Rough lumber is now selling at \$55 per M, but will drop to \$32 on arrival of the railroad in December.

Searchlight is one of the most orderly mining camps in Nevada.

Mining Location Laws

There is a wrong impression current in relation to the annual holding work on unpatented mining locations. The law requiring sinking a 10-foot hole or running a cut or tunnel to cut the ledge at that depth is a Nevada statute, requiring that amount of development work to be performed after notices are posted and claim boundaries marked to complete such locations. The annual holding or assessment work of \$100 is a National law and has nothing whatever to do with the location work required by the State law, but the \$100 worth of labor required annually by the Federal mining statutes must be performed every year succeeding that on which locations were made, and neglect to comply with that provision will result in a forfeiture of title.—Virginia Chronicle.

Ely Smelter

Salt Lake Tribune: Visitors from the Ely district state that the Nevada Consolidated company has placed men at work upon the new smelter site at McGills, and that the excavating for this mammoth plant is well under way. It is generally understood that this smelter will cost in the neighborhood of \$6,000,000, and from Boston recently came word that all the arrangements had been made for erecting a 10,000-ton plant.

CLARK ROAD TO FRISCO

Regarded as a Strong Probability

Reno Gazette: It is a current rumor in railroad circles that the Salt Lake and San Pedro railway will have an inlet into San Francisco within a year or more. The road was financed and built by William A. Clark, copper magnate and United States Senator from Montana, and runs from San Pedro, in Southern California, to Salt Lake, where there are terminal connections with the Harriman lines. Harriman is reported to have a large interest in the Clark road, which was brought about by the threat of the former to refuse terminal rates and connections at Salt Lake unless he was permitted to purchase an interest in the road.

The next difference came when Clark proposed to build from Las Vegas to the gold fields of Manhattan, Goldfield and Tonopah. Harriman refused to go in on the proposition and Clark started in to build independently of him. The building of the road has progressed favorably and it will tap this rich mining district within a short time. Contracts of such favorable character have been made that it is reported Senator Clark is to extend his field of operations and build into San Francisco.

To do this he will have to cross the Sierra Nevada range, but he is now within a comparatively short distance of this.

It is said that Clark has acquired a controlling interest in the Sierra railway, which runs from Oakdale, California, on the Southern Pacific, nearly to the summit of the range. When this gap has been supplied the only one to fill will be between Oakdale and San Francisco, and terminal facilities are said to have already been provided for in San Francisco through the purchase of a large and controlling interest in the Key Route road. This cannot be verified beyond the certainty of a doubt, but is common rumor among the railroad people that this deal is on, and, if consummated, Senator Clark will obtain an inlet into San Francisco independent of the Harriman lines.

Hot Air

The mining boom at Monarch, Nye county, has collapsed and Blanchard, the chief promoter, is shy \$73,000 on the venture.—Virginia Chronicle.

APEX LAW

Repeal Favored by Mining Congress

Establishment of a federal department of mining; legislation to prevent floating of wildcat schemes; reductions in the treatment of ores by the smelting trust; advocating of a law providing that any number of persons, not less than ten, so the committee suggests, owning claims in any mining district, the aggregate acreage of which is not less than 320 acres, may move for the organization of a mine drainage district, is the gist of the subjects discussed at the annual meeting of the American Mining congress recently in session at Denver, Colorado. The congress also favored the repeal of the existing federal "law of the apex," and the substitution thereof of a law giving mineral rights within vertical lines.

AMENDMENT

The Proposed Constitutional Amendment to be Voted for at the General Election Tuesday, Nov. 6, 1906

Resolved by the Assembly, the Senate concurring, that the Constitution of the State of Nevada be amended so as to read as follows:

Amend Section 1, Article 10, of the Constitution of the State of Nevada, so that the same shall read as follows:

Section One.—The Legislature shall provide by law for a uniform and equal rate and assessment of taxation, and shall prescribe such regulations as shall secure a just valuation for taxation of all property, real, personal and mining claims, when not patented, the proceeds alone of which shall be assessed and taxed, and when patented, each patented mine shall be assessed at not less than five hundred dollars (\$500), except when one hundred dollars (\$100) in labor has been actually performed on such patented mine during the year, in addition to the tax upon the net proceeds, and, also, excepting such property as may be exempted by law for municipal, educational, literary, scientific or other charitable purposes.

The above is a constitutional amendment that the voters of Lincoln county will vote on at the coming election.

Record Price for Silver

The director of the Mint Monday purchased 150,000 ounces of silver at 70.13 cents per fine ounce, delivered at the mint in Denver.

For the convenience of bidders it has been decided to open bids for sale of silver on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays of each week, instead of on Wednesdays only, as heretofore.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

One Constitutional Amendment—No. XII.

BALLOTS

All election tickets or ballots to be used at the said ensuing General Election, in Lincoln County, Nevada, shall be such as are prescribed by the election law and furnished by the Secretary of State. Each ballot or ticket shall be free from all marks, characters, or device of things that would enable any person to distinguish it by the back, or when folded, from any other ticket or ballot, and no mark shall be made on such ballots except this X, with a rubber stamp only in the square opposite the name of the candidate you vote for. The name of no candidate shall be erased or crossed out, and the ballot must not be marked in any manner except by said cross X, in said square, otherwise the ballot will not be counted.

SAMPLE BALLOTS

One sample ballot will be provided for by the Board of Election, for each registered voter, as appears in Section 23, page 57, Australian Ballot Law. Upon application, each registered voter will be given one sample ballot.
