### QUICKSILVER

Formation Favorable to Discovery in Nevada

It has been frequently remarked that the vigorous prospecting now going on in Nevada has not resulted in the discovery of valueble quicksilver mines. It would seem that conditions are particularly favorable for deposition of mercury minerals, in a region where the hot spring action has been so universal. The presence of mercury in the solfataras of Steamboat Springs, near Reno, has long been known, but deposits of commercial importance have not as yet been found, with the exception of that discovered some four months ago near Ione, Nye county.

The average prospector will overlook these ores because he does not know them, or is so engrossed in the search for gold that he neglects them. Mercury minerals usually occur at or near the contact of sandstone and serpentine. This applies to all the known deposits in the world, though there are numerous occurrences under other conditions, but they are of local importance and have never been demonstrated to be of great value. The usual form in which the element occurs is cinnabar, and is the sulphide of the metal. Its characteristics are so pronounced that it should be recognized at once by an intelligent prospector.—Nevada Mining Investor.

### PLATFORM

The Republican Party of Nevada, in State Convention assembled, submits the glorious history of party achievement of the adminis-tration of Theodore Roosevelt as marking the highest success of American governs From a debtor nation—the heritage left b highest success of American government. The Panama Canal has been made possible. The arid West will be reclaimed by Government aid. The trusts have been curbed by stringent laws the railroads shorn of discriminating abuses. Above all, there has been infused into the conduct of public affairs a new standard of civil probity, the exemplar of which is Roosevelt. These are the signal results of a decade of Republicanism which we submit to the voters of Nevada with confidence as to their answer at the polls.

### State Government

The contrast between the administrative success of the Republican Party in National affairs and the humili, ting history of Democratic inefficiency in Nevada calls for a change in the political control of the State. Mines and Mining The great mineral wealth of Nevada is a treasury of fortune belonging to rich and poor alike. Every protection and encouragement

should be given the mining industry that may be accomplished by legislation. We favor the passage of a law extending the right of eminent domain for mining purposes to apply to locations made upon unlenced and unimproved lands held in private ownership, the minerals within which are reserved by the Goyernment, that purchase may be made of the surface thereof by a locator after proper appraisement; and we condemn the vetoing of such a law three years since by a Democratic Governor of Nevada after its passage by an overwhelming vote of the Legislature. We favor conservative legislation tending to reduce the abuses of an excessive number of locations by one or more common locators, and favor a reduction in the time for marking the boundaries as tending to prevent confusion of title and litigation.

We further favor the passage of a law to render the officers and promoters of stock companies liable for the reasonable correctness of advertising statements and prospectuses designed to induce the public to purchase shares.

### Capital and Labor

The Republican Party originated in an irre pressible conviction entertained by free and courageous workingmen of the United States that slave labor had no place in the fabric of a free and intelligent government. Ever since that time it has been the steadfast advocate of the dignity and the just compensation of all those whose labor has so richly contributed to our national grandeur and strength. We challenge our political opponents to point to any Republican measure which has not kept in view the best interests of labor and capital alike. We recognize the fact that each is useless without the other, and that the happiest alike. We recognize the fact that each is use-less without the other, and that the happiest results can only be attained by their harmo-nious co-operation upon equitable principles. We submit that more has been accomplished in this direction by the Republican Party during the last two administrations than ever before occurred since we became an independent nation. ### Tariff

We continue to inflexibly stand as the earnest supporters of the American protective tariff principle. Every attack thereon formulated into law has been followed by languishing industries, general distress and the humiliation of American workmen. Direct competition upon even terms between the products of American labor and those of foreign labor is the equivalent of ruinous competition between the laborers themselves.

### Taxation of National Banks

We demand that the capital invested in all national banks situate in Nevada shall bear its just proportion of taxation, and we censure the act of Governor Sparks in vetoing the bill passed by the last Legislature providing for such taxation, and we declare equally culpable with him Democratic members of the last Legislature who by their votes sustained the veto.

### Public School System

2 Our public school system will continue in the future, as it has in the past, to find an un-failing friend in the Republican Party. The vital importance of liberal education as the surest adequate preparation for a self-govern-ing people cannot be overestimated by those who are sincerely attached to our form of gov-ernment. As an important part of our educaernment. As an important part of our educa-tional system the Nevada State University should appeal to the pride of all citizens, and we firmly declare that until the promulgation of the late Nevada Democratic platform there has been no politics suggested as ever having been exercised in its management and control.

As a greeting to our political brethren living beyond our territorial limits, and as a message to all of the well-disposed citizens of Neyada, a State now marching with giant strides toward the goal of abundant wealth, regal strength and exalted civic virtues, we confidently predict that at the next ensuing election a large majority of the voters of Nevada will again record their earnest approvl of Republican principles and their cordial endorsement of our matchless leader and chief executive, President Theodore Rooseveit.
