# QUICKSILVER

**Formation Favorable to Discovery in Nevada**

It has been frequently remarked that the vigorous prospecting now going on in Nevada has not resulted in the discovery of valuable quicksilver mines. It would seem that conditions are particularly favorable for deposition of mercury minerals, in a region where the hot spring action has been so universal. The presence of mercury in the solfataras of Steamboat Springs, near Reno, has long been known, but deposits of commercial importance have not as yet been found, with the exception of that discovered some four months ago near Ione, Nye county. The average prospector will overlook these ores because he does not know them, or is so engrossed in the search for gold that he neglects them. Mercury minerals usually occur at or near the contact of sandstone and serpentine. This applies to all the known deposits in the world, though there are numerous occurrences under other conditions, but they are of local importance and have never been demonstrated to be of great value. The usual form in which the element occurs is cinnabar, and is the sulphide of the metal. Its characteristics are so pronounced that it should be recognized at once by an intelligent prospector.—Nevada Mining Investor.

# STATE NEWS

Nevada has harvested the largest crop of cereals and fruits this year than ever before in her history.

A flow of hot salt water was struck by the Southern Pacific at Hazen last week at a depth of 750 feet.

Within the next six weeks the municipality of Tonopah will have an up-to-date gas plant in operation.

It is reported that the Guggenheim people have bought the antimony mines at Bernice, Churchill county.

Passenger travel is so heavy on the S. P. that two extra trains have been put on between Ogden and Sparks.

E. B. Clark, editor of the Fairview Miner, has skipped, leaving several thousand dollars in bills behind.

The salt deposits at Sand Springs, Churchill county, are attracting the attention of the Southern Pacific Co.

The railroad company will start a school at Sparks for educating its employes in the higher branches of railroading.

It is reported that the Bell Telephone company is making arrangements to get control of the private telephone lines in Nevada.

# After Business

The Age learns on good authority that the "Borax" Smith road is offering special inducements to the larger operators in Greenwater and Bullfrog districts with a view to securing their freight business.

Nearly all freight for these sections now goes in over the Clark roads by way of Las Vegas, but it is understood that the Smith road has already arranged to take over some of the business.

Unless the Clark roads can see their way clear to meet this competition both the railroad and Las Vegas merchants will lose a considerable volume of business.

It is hardly reasonable to suppose, however, that the Clark roads will permit their business to be taken away without a struggle.

should be given the mining industry that may be accomplished by legislation. We favor the passage of a law extending the right of eminent domain for mining purposes to apply to locations made upon unmined and unimproved lands held in private ownership, the minerals within which are reserved by the Government, the purchase may be made of the surface thereof by a locator after proper appraisal; and we condemn the vetoing of such a law three years since by a Democratic Governor of Nevada after its passage by an overwhelming vote of the Legislature. We favor conservative legislation tending to reduce the abuses of an excessive number of locations by one or more common locators and favor a reduction in the time for marking the boundaries as tending to prevent confusion of title and litigation.

We further favor the passage of a law to render the officers and promoters of stock companies liable for the reasonable correctness of divulging statements and prospectuses designed to induce the public to purchase shares.

**Capital and Labor**  
The Republican Party originated in an irrefragable conviction entertained by free and courageous workmen of the United States that slave labor had no place in the fabric of a free and intelligent government. Ever since that time it has been the steadfast advocate of the security and the just compensation of all those whose labor has so richly contributed to our national grandeur and strength. We challenge our political opponents to show us a Republican measure which has not kept in view the best interests of labor and capital alike. We recognize the fact that such is useless without the other, and that the happiest results can only be attained by their harmonious co-operation upon equitable principles. We zealously favor the highest compensation for labor and the most satisfactory arrangements compatible with the successful prosecution of business enterprises, and we will ever insist that all property and investments shall have the complete and efficient protection of law whenever unjustly assailed.

**Railroad Anti-Rebate Law**  
We heartily approve of the late railroad rate law passed by a Republican Congress and initiated and signed by President Roosevelt. We believe that all large aggregations of capital, and especially such as are actively engaged in interstate commerce, should be restrained from all unreasonable exactions from the general public. We submit that more has been accomplished in this direction by the Republican Party during the last two administrations than ever before occurred since we became an independent nation. We pledge our candidate for Congress to support any legislation appearing reasonable and necessary to prevent corporate aggression against popular rights.

**Tariff**  
We continue to inflexibly stand as the earnest supporters of the American protective tariff principle. Its supremacy has been invariably accompanied by industrial development, the elevation of labor and the expansion of trade and commerce. Every attack thereon formulated into law has been followed by languishing industries, general distress and the humiliation of American workmen. We believe that the tollers of our great national tariff have brought into our country a competition with the underpaid laborers of densely populated and ignorant foreign countries. Direct competition upon even terms between the products of American labor and those of foreign labor is the equivalent of ruinous competition between the laborers themselves.

**Taxation of National Banks**  
We demand that the capital invested in all national banks situate in Nevada shall bear its just proportion of taxation, and we censure the act of Governor Sparks in vetoing the bill passed by the last Legislature providing for such taxation, and we declare equally culpable with him Democratic members of the last Legislature who by their votes sustained the veto.

**Public School System**  
Our public school system will continue in the future as it has in the past, to find an unflinching friend in the Republican Party. The vital importance of liberal education as the surest adequate preparation for a self-respecting people cannot be overestimated by those who are sincerely attached to our form of government. As an important part of our educational system the Nevada State University should appeal to the pride of all citizens, and we firmly declare that until the promulgation of the late Nevada Democratic platform there has been no politics suggested as ever having been exercised in its management and control.

# PLATFORM

The Republican Party of Nevada, in State Convention assembled, submits the glorious history of party achievement in the United States of Theodore Roosevelt as marking the highest success of American government. From a debtor nation—the heritage left by the last Democratic administration—the United States, in a decade of Republican control, has passed to the first place among the creditor nations of the earth. The music of profuse industry fills the air. The wage earner walks the earth now as one to be reckoned with in the division of prosperity. Justice has smitten the highest as well as the meanest offender. Graft has been purged from the conduct of public affairs. Laws of supreme moment to mankind have been passed. The Panama Canal has been made possible. The arid West will be reclaimed by Government aid. The trusts have been curbed by stringent laws. The railroads short of the discriminating abuses, above all, there has been infused into the conduct of public affairs a new standard of civility, the exemplar of which is Roosevelt. These are the signal results of a decade of Republicanism which we submit to the voters of Nevada with confidence as to their answer at the polls.

**State Government**  
The contrast between the administrative success of the Republican Party in National affairs and the humiliating history of Democratic inefficiency in Nevada calls for a change in the political control of the State. With officials habitually absent from the capitol, the executive departments of the state in Democratic hands are conducted with only haphazard regard to the public business. Such absenteeism is notorious and coupled with the complete non-attendance of the Democratic member of Congress from his duties in Washington, condemns that party as unworthy the further trust of the people. We are entering upon a golden era of development and the necessity is urgent to vest the powers of State into competent hands. We pledge each and every nominee of this convention for any office to, at all times when not justifiably excused therefrom, remain at his post of duty, ready and prepared to cheerfully perform all public services required of him by law or by a proper regard for the convenient dispatch of official duties.

**Commendation**  
We endorse and commend the course of Honorable George S. Nixon in the Senate of the United States upon the pending question before this Congress. His strong support of Roosevelt and his vote upon the railroad anti-rebate law and other measures vital to the welfare of the people together with his business-like attention to the interests of Nevada, is a source of satisfaction to his party and congratulation to his State.
