Ores to Salt Lake, Trade to Los Angeles

Los Angeles has reached the conclusion that if she wants the great trade of Southern Nevada she must get a move on. Salt Lake is already in the field and bidding for the Bullfrog business, and as soon as the railroad connection is made with Goldfield her emissaries will be thick in the field endeavoring to wrest the plum from San Francisco, says the Goldfield Review.

Geographically considered, and with a shorter haul in her favor, Los Angeles stands a chance of receiving a large share of the patronage, providing the business man can deliver the goods. That the merchants believe they can is instanced by a statement that an advertising car is being prepared and will be sent at once to the Bullfrog country, stopping at intermediary points, for the purpose of letting the miners and merchants know of their facilities. Los Angeles has been built through the greatest advertising system the world has ever known, but whether the same will work advantageously in a mining section remains to be seen.

In the meantime Salt Lake will treat the ores and Los Angeles furnish the necessities despite exorbitant transportation fares.

A Copper State

If present expectations are realized gold will not always hold the premier position among the metal products of Nevada. Copper is beginning to make insistent claims for recognition as a factor of importance. In fact, the reports of the later strikes and excavations are concerned with copper rather than with gold, and although the State has always produced some copper, it gives promise of attaining prominence in that line.

The districts of greatest promise and present interest are those of Ely and Yerrington, in the northerly part, and the newer discovered camps of Cuprite, Furnace Creek and Greenwater in the south. The latter must, perforce, be shared with California, but there is evidence that this will in no wise detract from Nevada, for if the new discoveries amount to much they will be so extensive as to contribute heavily to both States. Probably no better evidence could be offered in support of the genuineness of the future of copper in Nevada than the fact that the present known copper districts have been literally invaded by large interests which appreciate the future of the metal.—Mining Recorder.

Department of Mines

Salt Lake Tribune: The Government of the United States should not only speedily establish a department of mines which shall aid and direct in proper manner this industry's development, but care should be taken that at least one member of the court of last resort be sufficiently trained in mining law and in the nomenclature of mines to properly understand the intricacies of mining litigation. The importance of this is well known to mining lawyers and to mining men. So often do rights to vast properties depend on the interpretation of a word or of an expression that the most learned justice is apt to err, much more him whose training and whose personal observation have not fitted him for this work.

The next few years will witness mining litigation of such tremendous importance that it would seem to be not only a propriety but almost obligatory that members of Congress from the West bring this matter to the attention of the President.

AMENDMENT

The Proposed Constitutional Amendment to be Voted for at the General Election Tuesday, Nov. 6, 1906

Resolved by the Assembly, the Senate concurring, that the Constitution of the State of Nevada be amended so as to read as follows:

Amend Section 1, Article 10, of the Constitution of the State of Nevada, so that the same shall read as follows:

Section One.—The Legislature shall provide by law for a uniform and equal rate and assessment of taxation, and shall prescribe such regulations as shall secure a just valuation for taxation of all property, real, personal and possessory, except mines and mining claims, when not patented, the proceeds alone of which shall be assessed and taxed, and when patented, each patented mine shall be assessed at not less than five hundred dollars (\$500), except when one hundred dollars (\$100) in labor has been actually performed on such patented mine during the year, in addition to the tax upon the net proceeds, and, also, excepting such property as may be exempted by law for municipal, educational, literary, scientific or other charitable purposes.

Colorado Bridled

Word has been sent out from Imperial to the effect that the California Development company has at last succeeded in turning the runaway current of the Colorado river back into its original bed, and that for the first time in many months the entire flow of the old river is at last running into the gulf, instead of emptying into the Salton sink.

The success of the measures taken to arrest the old river read the doom of the Salton sea, which will quickly vanish, leaving in its stead a rich valley, the salt beds being covered to a depth of many feet with the rich alluvial soils which were delivered by the Colorado. It is anticipated that the cultivation of nearly 600 square miles thus redeemed will quickly wipe out the expense account which the Southern Pacific has incurred in its efforts to turn the river into its former channel.

PLATFORM

The Republican Party of Nevada, in State Convention assembled, submits the glorious history of party achievement of the administration of Theodore Roosevelt as marking the highest success of American government. From a debtor nation—the heritage left by the last Democratic administration—the United States, in a decade of Republican control, has passed to the first place among the creditor nations of the earth. The wage earner walks the earth now as one to be reckoned with in the division of prosperity. Justice has smitten the highest as well as the meanest offender. Public affairs, laws of supreme moment to mankind have been passed. The Panama Canal will be reclaimed by the government and the trusts have been curbed by stringent laws; the railroads shorn of discriminating abuses. Above all, there has been infused into the conduct of public affairs a new standard of civic probity, the exemplar of which is Roosevelt. These are the signal results of a decade of Republicanism which we submit to the voters of Nevada with confidence as to their answer at the polls.

State Government

The contrast between the administrative success of the Republican Party in National affairs and the humiliating history of Democratic inefficiency in Nevada calls for a change in the political control of the State. With officials habitually absent from the capitol, the executive departments of the State in Democratic hands are conducted with only haphazard regard to the public business. Such absenteeism is notorious and coupled with the complete non-attendance of the Democratic member of Congress from his duties in Washington, condemns that party as unworthy the further trust of the people. We are entering upon a golden era of development and the necessity is urgent to rest the powers of State into competent hands. We pledge each and every nominee of this convention for any office to all times when not justifiably excused therefrom, to remain at his post of duty, ready and prepared to cheerfully perform all public services required of him by law or by a proper regard for the convenient dispatch of official duties.

Commendation

We endorse and commend the course of Honorable George S. Nixon in the Senate of the United States upon the great public questions before this Congress. His strong support of Roosevelt and his vote upon the railroad anti-trust law and other measures vital to the welfare of the people, together with his businesslike attention to the interests of Nevada, is a source of satisfaction to his party and congratulation to his State.

Mines and Mining

The great mineral wealth of Nevada is a treasury of fortune belonging to rich and poor

alike. Every protection and encouragement should be given the mining industry that may be accomplished by legislation. We favor the passage of a law extending the right of eminent domain for mining purposes to apply to locations made upon unlocated and unimproved lands held in private ownership; the minerals within which are reserved by the Government, that purchase may be made of the surface thereof by a locator after proper appraisal, and we condemn the voting of such a law three years since by a Democratic Governor of Nevada after its passage by an overwhelming vote of the Legislature. We favor counteractive legislation tending to reduce the abuses of an excessive number of locations by one or more common locators, and favor a restriction on the time for marking off boundaries as tending to prevent confusion of title and litigation.

We further favor the passage of a law to regulate officers and promoters of stock companies liable for the reasonable correctness of advertising statements and prospectuses designed to induce the public to purchase shares.

Capital and Labor

The Republican Party originated in an irrepressible conviction entertained by free and courageous workmen of the United States that slave labor and the corrupt government of the day had been the cause of the degradation and the just compensation of all those who labor in this country. We challenge our political opponents to point to any Republican measure which has not been the result of the best interests of labor and capital alike. We recognize the fact that each is useless without the other, and that the happiest results can only be attained by harmonious co-operation upon equitable principles. We zealously favor the highest compensation for labor and the most satisfactory conditions of business enterprises, and we will ever insist that all property and vested rights shall have the complete and efficient protection of law whenever unjustly assailed.

Railroad Anti-Rebate Law

We heartily approve of the late railroad rate law passed by a Republican Congress and initiated and signed by President Roosevelt. We believe that all industrial aggregations of capital, and especially such as are actively engaged in interstate commerce, should be restrained from all undue or predatory practices against the public. We submit that more has been accomplished in this direction by the Republican Party during the last two administrations than ever before occurred since we became an independent nation. We pledge our candidate for Congress to support any legislation appearing reasonable and necessary to prevent corporate aggression against popular rights.

Tariff

We continue to inflexibly stand as the earnest supporters of the American protective tariff principle. Its supremacy has been invariably accomplished by industrial development, the elevation of labor and the expansion of trade and commerce. Every attack thereon formulated into law has been followed by languishing industries, general distress and the humiliation of American workmen. We believe that the toilers of our great nation should not be brought into unduly disadvantageous competition with the underpaid laborers of densely populated and ignorant foreign countries. Direct competition upon even terms between the products of American labor and those of foreign labor is the equivalent of ruinous competition between the laborers themselves.

Taxation of National Banks

We demand that the capital invested in all national banks situate in Nevada shall bear its just proportion of taxation, and we condemn the act of Governor Sparks in vetoing the bill passed by the last Legislature providing for such taxation, and we declare equally culpable with him Democratic members of the last Legislature who by their votes sustained the veto.

Public School System

Our public school system will continue in the future, as it has in the past, to find an unflinching friend in the Republican Party. The vital importance of liberal education as the surest acquisition preparation for a self-governing people cannot be overestimated by those who are sincerely attached to our form of government. As an important part of our educational system the Nevada State University should appeal to the pride of all citizens, and we firmly declare that until the promulgation of the late Nevada Democratic platform there has been no politics suggested as ever having been exercised in its management and control.

Greeting

As a greeting to our political brethren living beyond our territorial limits, and as a message to all of the well-disposed citizens of Nevada, a state now marching with giant strides toward the goal of abundant wealth, regal strength and exalted civic virtues, we cordially predict that at the next ensuing election a large majority of the voters of Nevada will again record their earnest approval of Republican principles and the cordial endorsement of our marshall leader and chief executive, President Theodore Roosevelt.
