WATER RIGHTS

State Engineer Compiling Records to End Litigation

In view of possible litigation over the waters of Las Vegas creek and other streams in Southern Nevada, the following from the Eureka Sentinel will be of interest: "Henry Thurtell, who left his chair in the Nevada State University to accept a position as State Engineer, is carrying out a project relating to water rights that will be of inestimable value to the people of Nevada."

"Basing his work upon the Wyoming system, he is making a detailed record of all the water rights in the State, compiling a careful abstract of each right in order to prevent litigation between rival claimants in the future. When the system is perfected he believes that 95 per cent of the litigation over water will be done away with."

"For over a year Engineer Thurtell has given his almost undivided attention to the water rights on the Walker and Carson rivers. He is now beginning work on the Humboldt, the longest river in the State, having a total length of 1000 miles. Owing to the scarcity of water in the valleys of the Humboldt the task will consume considerable time, but he believes the State will be well repaid for the work."

"We are tracing the records back to the earliest days of settlement," he explained, "and the question of priority will thus be effectually settled. In Wyoming there is practically no litigation any more over water, and we hope to stop it in Nevada. There are over two-thirds of a million acres of land in the State now that depend upon irrigation for crops."

BULLION TAXES

Now Collected on \$1,000,000 per Month

J. H. Nevin, state license and bullion tax collector, states that Nevada's mineral output is growing very rapidly and that a tax is being collected on an output of \$1,000,000 per month. This tax he says, is not collected on the mill cores and that which is on the dumps, but comprises only the actual shipments.

The principal counties contributing to this great output, are Esmeralda, Nye, Lincoln, Storey, Lyon and Eureka, and in each of these counties the output is steadily growing. In White Pine, Washoe and Lander counties, says Mr. Nevin, there is great activity in mining and there is no question but that these counties will be a close second to those named above in a very short time.

Mr. Nevin is also state liquor license collector and says that all over the state during the past six months, the revenue derived from liquor licenses has increased very materially.

Flags Train for Water

Passengers on the Los Angeles Limited of the Salt Lake railroad, who arrived in Los Angeles a few days ago, told of a prospector who stopped a train running 40 miles an hour in the middle of the Mojave desert by flagging it with his hat to secure water for himself and burros. The train crew supplied them all by the bucketful as quickly as possible, and started the limited on its way again.

An old Nevada law, which allows desert travelers who are in distress to stop trains and demand water, and compels train crews to provide the needed refreshments, still holds. The old prospector knew it, so did the engineer.

VOTING STRENGTH

Is More Than Double That of Four Years Ago

The total vote of Lincoln county at the State election in 1902, according to the published official count, was 658.

The registration lists this year show a total of 1495. As is always the case in a country where new towns and camps are being established almost daily, a certain portion of the population is continually shifting; but allowing for this, it is safe to figure that the vote polled in Lincoln county at the coming election will be more than double what it was four years ago—or, to be conservative, above 1200.

Las Vegas and Searchlight have each 320 registered voters, a total of 640. Allowing for a liberal shrinkage, these two towns will still be in a position to control the election.

Citizens of both towns should realize this fact and stand together for the only candidates they have been allowed on the county tickets—commissioners and assemblymen. One commissioner and one assemblyman should be elected from each town regardless of politics.

Bartlett's Foresight

Goldfield Review: The friends of O. J. A good amendment turned down will be brought up again, but a bad amendment enacted into law is hard to repeal.

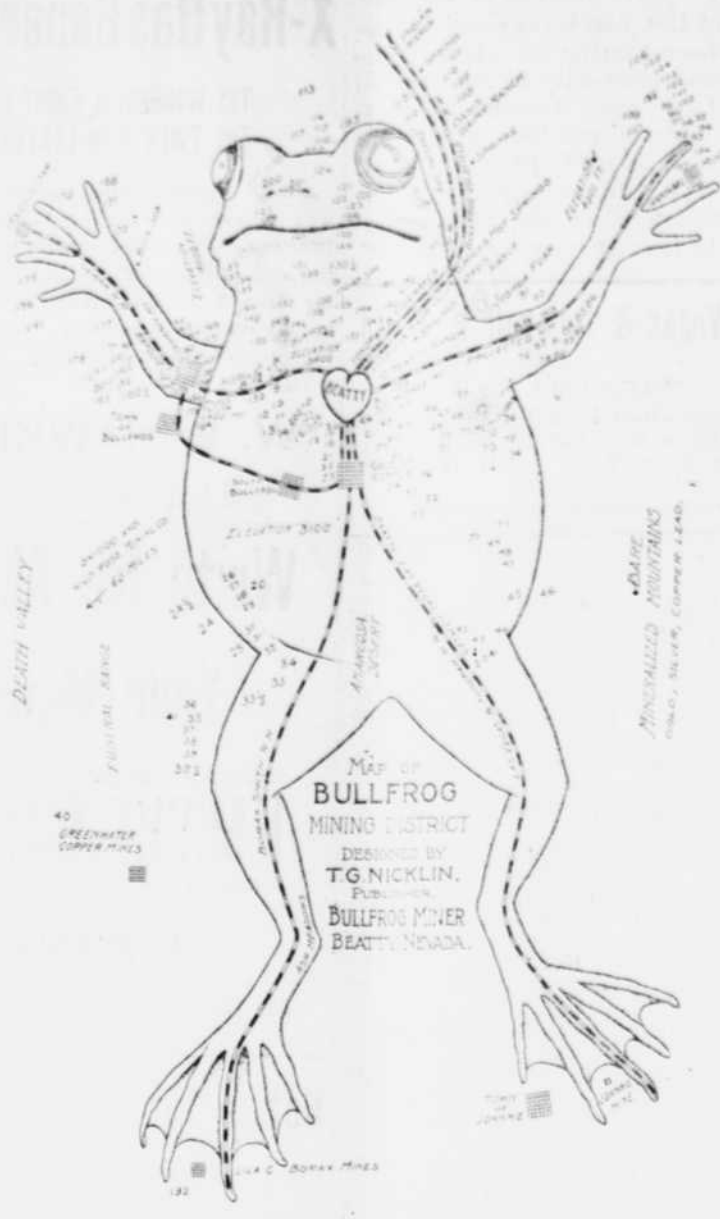
Taxes! Taxes!
